A Large Death Roll.

she recovered however, but the heart had grown weaker and she succumbed. She was in her 82nd year having been born on 23 Jan. 1827, in the county of Dumfriesshire, Scotland. Her maiden name was Burnet, a sister of Mr. Arch. Burnet, Hopeville and of the late Jas. Burnet, Durham. Besides her brother there remain three sisters: Janet, Mrs Clive, Cayuga; Jennie, Mrs. Curran, Hamilton; Joanna, Mrs. Wm. Anderson, Glenelg.

To these her death will come with the pang of separation of early ties, but how much more and deeper must it be to her family and especially to her aged partner who survives her. Had she lived to the 13th inst., she would have completed 90 years of married life, a span of conjugal union given to but few.

She was married to Mr. Jas. Laidlaw near Annan, Dumfriesshire, Scotland on the 13th of August in the far gone year of 1848. With him she faced the new world, with him she bore the trials incident to beginners and pioneers of a new country, with him she lived to see their family grow up around them to positions of respect and usefulness, and we never felt the power and pathos and eloquence of a eulogy as, when referring to his loss, we heard her aged partner say "She was faithful and true."

To this couple were born nine children, two of whom died in infancy. Those living are: Jean, Mrs. Elliott, Brit. Columbia; Mary, Mrs. Barton, Chicago; Eliza, in Buffalo; William, best known of the family and ex-mayor of Durham; Jessie, Mrs. Jamieson, Toledo, O.; James, Los Angeles; Robert, Detroit.

After working at his trade of stone cutter in various parts of the three kingdoms, the young couple came to N. York in 1852, later to Hamilton and Toronto where he worked on Molson's Bank and Osgoode Hall, and in 1855 they moved to the 4th Concession in Glenelg Durhain.

Deceased was a woman with much force of character; her memory will always be cherished by her family and many besides to whom in the days of her strength she was a ministering angel as nurse and friend in sickness or trouble, as is now being recalled.

She was buried on Tuesday, in Saugseen cemetery, many friends from town and country paying the last tribute. Rev. Mr. Farquharson conducted services at home and grave.

The pall-bearers were Messrs W. B. Vollet, Arch. Davidson, A. H. Jackson, Duncan McKenzie, C. L. Grant, John Robertson.
