In Winnipeg.

Dear Review Readers, Friday morning 21 Aug., at 7 20 three full days from Durham, found us still 60 miles from Winnipeg, and meeting signs of purely rural settlement once more.

We have had good-bye to the rocks and largely to the tamaracs and the birch and are now in prairie country, with roads, a school house, a few wheatfields and outfields and a surprising amount of hay in stacks or to stack.

Now we are in Winnipeg, a city of over 100,000 population, largely, we have to think, a colony of folk from Durham and South Grey. One is impressed with many things; the enormous human traffic the arrangements in a magnificent station, already proving small for handling crowds.

Winnipeg has been often described and judged by the growth of the last four or five years there is always much new to describe. To us used to Toronto excursion coming to-day, "No" then with emphasis, "thank goodness no."

The city keeps constantly outgrowing its school and college accommodation, and the authorities are kept busy planning for new ones.

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Yesterday, Sunday, we heard the Assembly Moderator, Rev. Dr. Val preach in Knox Church. His plenary was out of town. Church attendance is, we believe, reckoned very fair, but the usual allotments of a big city we fear, hinder the worship that should be. But what can you expect? yesterday 3,000 more harvesters came in in the morning and were shipped west in the evening; no wonder Moose Jaw council had to feel 200 harvesters, dollars and doughnuts all gone; stranded amid plenty but nothing to eat. The invasion is being looked upon as serious for everybody but the C. P. R.

We must in a future letter say something of the many kind welcomes we had from "down east" friends, since it is this time to say that we were specially indebted to Mr. Joseph Moore, who threw up his duties to chaperon his old teacher through the city, and did it most efficiently. He had and has our warmest thanks for the great treat.

As we have indicated, Winnipeg seems a colony of South Grey. Here we are staying with Mrs. Baird, a native of Egremont, and an acquaintance of 40 years. Next to Mrs. Baird, Mrs. Calder, the latter a sister of Mrs. Baird (Janet) and their brother Wm. Baird, all doing well. Mr. Small has a responsible oversight over the baggage department of the C. N.
