Free Street Cars as a Cure. If the streets are to be lined with buildings, eight and nine hundred feet high no sunlight will reach them except for a few minutes during some part of the day, and if they are not favorably situated the rays of the sun will never penetrate the narrow canyons between the towers. This will raise new problems of sanitation, and these problems are now rising faster than science and the resources of the municipalities can solve them. The streets which are now overcrowded will not be able to accommodate the myriads of persons who must go to and from every one of these cities in the air. Some of the New York streets already have three storeys-the surface, the subway and the elevated. The elevated converts the surface into something only a little short of a tunnel.
