Milinery Openings. Last Wednesday and Thursday the Annual Fall Millinery Openings took place and as usual the ladies of Durham and vicinity showed their appreciation of the enterprise of our Milliners by turning out in large numbers.

At this busy and leading establishment, with Miss Grinyer again in charge, the display was first-class both in quantity and quality. This season hats are large being abundantly decorated with sweeping plumes and feathers. A few of the more admired hats are mentioned below but no description can take the place of a personal view.
