

### THE BORDEN MEETING.

"The Assyrian came down like a wolf on the fold,  
His cohorts all gleaming in purple and gold."  
Bryon's lines were suggested to us by the invasion of this country last week by Mr. Borden and his followers. The attack on Miller's "fold" was first planned for Hanover, but later it was expanded to include Durham and the cohorts came in right to both places if not in purple and gold certainly with purpose of plunging the knife into Miller.

Borden was there, and Hanna, Prov. Secretary, was there and Sproule, and Downey and Guelph and Hugh Clark of Kincardine, and Dr. Jamieson and Ball and perhaps others, all except Dr. Jamieson had their say and poured forth to an audience more or less sympathetic, the wrongs of the Laurier administration in general, and the sins of H. H. Miller in particular.

Birmingham and Foster had preceded this host playing on the same string, with one exception, and it must be evident to all that the word has been passed around "Miller must be beaten." What does 8 Grey think of it? Miller so far is playing a lone hand. He has called many meetings and placed his record before his constituents. It is a record to be proud of as even conservatives admit, and many of them will resent the attitude of their leaders in flooding the Riding with speakers in an effort to crush Miller.

The invasion is a compliment to the worth and excellence of our late member. It is so taken by his friends who will see to it, along with fair-minded Conservatives, that no such tactics will prevent him from being again the worthy representative of South Grey.

With a host of speakers it would surely be expected that all controversial points would be exploited—not one missed or overlooked. On this occasion there was one topic untouched. Who would imagine Dr. Sproule could speak and never mention Separate Schools in the North West? He did then and why? On the same platform was Mr. Downey, a Roman Catholic, and it was no doubt thought the part of wisdom to suppress all reference to it here.

This much is plain: Conservatives have certain planks in their platform that are not stepped upon in certain localities. Amies in Medicine Hat touches not so-called irrigation scandals; in Saskatchewan mention is not made of Saskatchewan Valley land transactions, in the presence of certain gentlemen Separate Schools are not referred to.

Not so with Laurier and Miller. On any and every platform in South Grey or beyond it, there is the same straight story. No fear exists of "putting their foot in it." They stand foursquare to every wind that blows, at no time limiting their remarks to suit their crowd or their case.

"Miller for South Grey in spite of Borden and his cohorts" should be the inspiring cry of every citizen who loves fair play, and who can see that the cries of graft, scandal, etc., are used for a purpose to defeat the best government Canada ever had and its wonderful progress for 32 years shows

### DR. SPROULE.

### THE TARIFF.

Efforts have been made to induce the farmers of Canada to favor higher protection, to the end that there might be thus provided for the agricultural products a larger and better home market.

The present Government has followed a different policy with very successful results. It has either put on the free list or reduced the duty on very many of the articles which may be considered as the farmers' raw material.

Among those placed on the free list are:

- Corn, for feeding purposes.
- Wire, for fencing purposes.
- Binder twine, chains, mould boards or shares.
- Crude petroleum for fuel.
- Cream separators and steel bowls for same.
- Substantial reductions were made on the following articles picked out at random from the tariff items:
- Mowing machines, harvesters, reapers.
- Portable engines, horse powers, and traction engines, for farm purposes.
- Windstackers, threshing machines, separators and parts thereof.
- Axes, scythes, sickles, hay or straw knives, edging knives, hoes, rakes and pronged forks.
- Hay loaders, potato diggers, fodder or feed cutters, grain crushers, fanning mills, hay tedders, farm, road or field rollers, post-hole diggers, snaths and other agricultural implements not otherwise specified.
- Stoves of all kinds for coal, wood, oil, spirits or gas.
- Lubricating oil, reduced from six cents to two and one-half cents per gallon.
- Kerosene (coal oil) reduced from six cents to two and one-half cents per gallon.

Besides the reductions under the general tariff there is the preference on goods imported from Great Britain and some other parts of the British Empire, in the vicinity of thirty-three per cent.

The whole tariff has been so reduced that the rate on the total sum of our importations has decreased no less than fifteen to sixteen per cent, compared with what it was in 1896.

The effect of these reductions has not been the dire ruin and disaster for the industries of Canada which Sir Charles Tupper predicted in 1897. The export figures show the very reverse, and that the "larger and better home market" which is promised the farmers if they will only consent to a tariff "as high as Haman's gallows" has not yet been realized. The tariff with the gradual lowering revenues tariff. The exports of manufactures which in 1896 were only \$9,365,384, had by 1906 risen to \$24,561,112.
