#### ELEVATOR BLEW UP.

large grain elevator having a capacity of 500,000 bushels, exploded late to-day, causing the death of at least eleven workmen and two women who were walking in the immediate vicinity. It is possible that the death role may be further increased when a careful search of the ruins can be made. The explosion blew off the entire roof of the big building, scattering timbers in all directions. and almost instantly flames burst out over the whole structure. Twenty-one men were employed in the building.
