HOUNDING MILLER.

We see that Mr Robert Birmingham, "Grand Organizer of the Orange Society for Ontario west," will address Public meetings at Allan Park and Louise shortly before the election day. Mr Miller, a little while ago, had a splendid meeting at Hanover a little while later and said he understood that some Orangemen had voted for Mr Miller at the last election and that he hoped that a good God would wither their right arms if they did so again. Mr Miller has since held successful meetings at Allan Park and Louise and Mr Birmingham is now being sent into the field to follow him at each of these places and we suppose he will use much the same language as he did at his Hanover meeting. One very much respected Orangeman of the Township of Bentinck says, that when Mr Birmingham used the language referred to follow him at each of these places and we suppose he was at another meeting in Walkerton and that Mr Birmingham, having been dropped from his position as Organizer of the Conservative party, should never have been employed by the Orange Society, and that a highly respected Orangeman of the Township of Sullivan has said that he knows both Mr Birmingham and Mr Miller very well and that he would sooner accept Mr Miller's word than Mr Birmingham's oath. Mr John W. Brown, well known as the late Principal of The Hanover Public School and member of the Orange Society there, writes from the Province of Alberta where he is now an Inspector of Schools, and says that Protestants and Catholics alike in the West are well satisfied with their School system and that it is absurd that Ontario people should be disturbed about it. We think that the Conservative Party is not, in any way, benefited and that the Orange Society is suffering a distinct loss in using Mr Birmingham as they appear to be using him in the present campaign. Mr Ball is right in advocating as Mr Miller does "clean Government and pure politics." Mr Ball is not consistent when he seeks to profit by the labor of such men as Mr Birmingham and Geo E. Foster. It rather makes us doubt his sincerity.

ROASTS FOR FOSTER— "Turn on the Tap."

Mr J. A. Macdonald, of the Globe, has confirmed, if not created, the needed, the charges against Geo E. Foster, that were investigated and condemned by the Insurance Commission.

At a public meeting he told of repeated requests by Foster to Dr Or- onyatekha, Supreme Chief of the Foresters, for money for the Union Trust Co. which was in difficulties. Mr Macdonald has the letters and one of them says "The wheels of the Union Trust are in need of oil. Turn on the tap." It is clearly proved that he asked for a commission and got it, amounting to \$2480.

It was Foresters' money he was speculating with. If loss had occurred the Foresters lost, if gain occurred as it did, the gain went to Mr Foster. The profits should have gone to the Society for he was paid, highly paid for his services as manager.

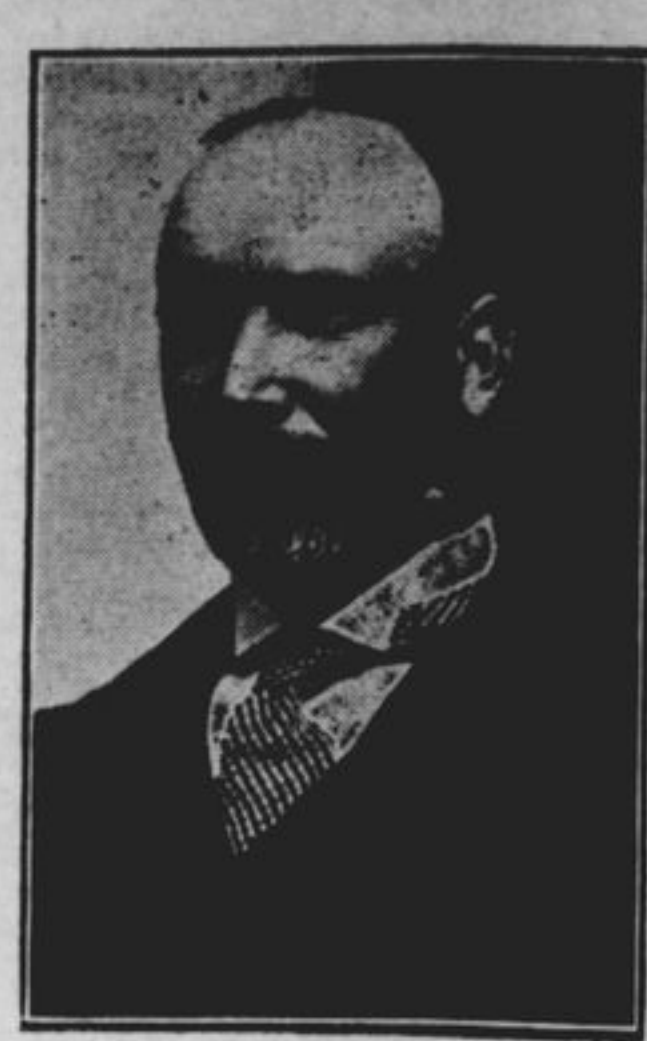
No wonder Mr Borden never appears on the same platform with him, but in Toronto he gave him a certificate of character which incalculates him and the party he leads in very same crime. No wonder the News some time ago, and the Montreal Star every day, both Conservative papers, urge the giving up of Foster.

Were all the charges of graft, &c., or half of them, true, made by Conservative speakers, Laurier and his supporters would be in difficulties. The public know this and get used to the mud-slinging of a party who leave off discussing great issues and grovel in the mire for evidence to convict.

The Laurier government is only human, it may have made mistakes, but no act of corruption has been charged against any member of the Liberal government. Every official against whom anything wrong was alleged has been promptly suspended.

The evil of the mud-slinging is seen in the bad impressions formed by outsiders as to the purity of our national life.

The demon of war is threatening Europe. Austria has seized Bosnia and Herzegovina, without saying "by your leave" to the Berlin treaty, Bulgaria has declared for complete independence from Turkey, which had only a shadow of a claim on it. Servia would fight anybody almost, but has no ammunition. France is very sorry, Russia has views of her own. Britain insists on the sanctity of a treaty until all parties are agreed to a change and supports the Russian and French view. Rightly or wrongly there appears the suspicion that the German Emperor is at the bottom of the mix-up. He is supporting Austria's claims.

Lib.-Conservative Candidate for South Grey and Warden of the County.

R. J. Ball, the Conservative candidate for South Grey, was born in the Township of Bentinck, County of Grey, near Allan Park, on the 24th day of January, 1872. When but a child his parents moved to Hampden, in the Township of Normanby, where he resided until 1875, working on the farm during the summer season and attending the Public School in the winter. In 1875 he wrote and obtained a teacher's certificate and for about three years he taught in the Township of Sullivan and in the Township of Normanby. In 1879 and 1880 he attended the Collegiate Institute in Collingwood and the Normal School in Ottawa. In 1881 he took charge of the Allan Park Public School, where he remained till August 1886. He then took charge of The Knechtel Furniture Co's factory and attended the Public School after which he spent three years at private banking. During all these years he was manager of a farm held by him, as well as operating for the Excelsior Life and other insurance companies. In 1898 he went into the manufacturing of chairs, which business he has followed successfully to the present time, being the chief stockholder and manager of The Ball Furniture Co's large factory. For the last seven years he has represented the Town of Hanover in their riding of South Grey. His platform is the general business public, and promises to contest strongly in the interests of his party and good government, the riding of South Grey. POLITICAL NOTES.

No act of Corruption has been charged against any member of the Liberal Government.

In every case the prices paid were certified as "fair and just" by T. J. appointees.

Every official against whom anything wrong was alleged has been promptly suspended by the Government.

While exceptions has been taken to the prices paid in trivial instances, it has never been charged that prices were corruptly paid.

Mr. Jas. S. Duff, member for W. Simcoe in the local house has been appointed minister of Agriculture in place of Mr. N. Monteith who was defeated at the polls. Hon. J. S. Duff will go back to work, but will not likely be opposed.

The chief errors raised in the West under Conservative rule were discontent and rebellion. There was one rebellion under Conservative rule in 1871, and another rebellion under Conservative rule in 1885. The Toronto Mail declared that the rebellion of 1885 was due to neglect and incompetence at Ottawa. The Winnipeg Times, another Conservative paper, said in 1882 that misgovernment was so bad that the settler left the country with a curse.

If the Opposition under Mr. Borden's leadership has become so demoralized that he simply cannot bring himself to be found associating with its leading and dominating spirits, what would happen if the party were in power? The fact that Mr. Borden has invited the Conservative leaders of the Provinces to his side to escape association with his own followers, throws a queer light on his party campaign. It is a confession that he cannot trust his own party even in Opposition. What would happen if the spoils of office were within their reach?

Sir Wilfrid has, moreover, a far more cohesive party than that of Mr. Borden. Mr. Borden's party is indeed plainly at daggers drawn with itself. Then the Liberal party has a record of twelve years to criticize, while we can only surmise what the future of its opponents would be. Their administrative lapses have fallen back into history. Those of the Liberal party have been glaring enough, but the worst of these have also been in error that are closed by the removal of the responsible ministers from office. Should the party get a new lease of power, we should hope for a further improvement in the personnel of the cabinet. —Witness
