*** A LONG FIGHT.

Case Heard by Fourteen Judges and Not Yet Settled.

Windsor, (Despatch) .- A decision of the Supreme Court in favor of the defendant in the case of Drulard against Welsh closes another chapter in a lawsuit which came up first in the Sandwich Assizes three years ago. The dispute was over the boundary line between two pieces of property on Jannette avenue owned by Mrs. Catharine Welsh and R. M. Drulard, and the owner-hip of a very narrow strip of land. When the case first came up Drulard obtained \$5 damages. Since then it has been carried from one court to another in appeals. Fourteen judges have heard it in all, eight deciding for the defendant and six for the plaintiff. Mrs. Welsh died about a year ago while the case was still before the Supreme Court, but the case nevertheless may be carried to the Privy Council in England.
