The Teachers' Convention.

The 31st Annual Convention of the S. Grey Teachers' Institute was held in Flesherton on Thursday and Friday last. At 10.30 a. m. the first day of the Convention opened with fully 50 teachers present, a number larger than usual here for some time.

After routine the following committee were appointed: Standing Com.—Messrs Rowe, Farquharson, Johnston; Misses McFarlane, New, A. O. McKenzie.

Com. on Resolutions—Messrs Heath, Allan, Rowe, Magee; Misses McClocklin and Armstrong.

The Association made a donation of \$2.00 to the O. E. A. funds, for which each teacher receives a list of salaries paid.

Miss Joy gave a timely paper on "How to make School attractive" which elicited much favorable discussion. Mr. Allan introduced a topic which his long experience and professional duties as model teacher peculiarly fitted him for.

The importance of sympathy and cheerfulness in school. From the discussion that followed and remarks made during the Convention it was no uncertainty that these qualities were looked upon as necessary for the proper acquisition of knowledge by the pupil.

In the afternoon Messrs Mitchell and Bellamy welcomed the Convention to the village and to the hospitality of their homes.

Mr. Ellsart, Dundalk, on "Tommy and the Teacher" struck a popular chord. In a humorous practical way he showed that "Tommy" was not to school for much of the troubles of school. What impressed "Tommy" was the personality of the teacher. Honest, straightforward dealing, seeing his co-operation, &c. The address was full, suggestive and practical.

"Character Building" was the title of a profitable paper by Miss Beamish and the same could be said of that on "Discipline" by Mr. McKenzie. Dr. Heath, of Flesherton, asked "Do Teachers ventilate their schools?" and the Convention was that teachers were not sufficiently careful in this matter. Insp. Campbell impressed upon all the necessity of attending to this duty.

Mr. Rowe, Markdale, on "Home Work" said care and common sense were necessary in assigning it, and faithfulness was necessary in seeing that it was done. A great factor was in securing the co-operation of the parents.

A very successful evening entertainment closed the first day. Miss Dixon presided, the treasurer of a fine orchestra, and local talent made a bright program. Proceeds \$12.50.

FRIDAY. President McGee thanked the Convention for the honor done him, but waived his address, as much of it had been duplicated, and called on Miss Stacombe who gave an excellent paper on "The Teacher's Mission. We are sure every teacher felt inspired to higher ideals as they listened to her.

Mr. Cornwell, B. A., Principal of Yorkford H. S., took up the subject of "Entrance Examination" the proper preparation for which many teachers were neglecting, judging by the answers he had seen. He caused great amusement by reading a large number of answers to the question "What is a promissory note?" showing plainly the absence of all knowledge of the thing itself. It was really a great object lesson, and his whole address was practical.

Miss McFarlane gave an interesting paper on "Elementary Art" exhibiting excellent work done by her pupils. Insp. Burgess of Owen Sound took up Part I of Entrance examination, and after outlining the required work said he had come to the conclusion some teachers were not honest. Some of the non-examination subjects were plainly neglected, though vouched for as having been taught. He gave a large number of valuable suggestions.

Mr. Cornwell again put the teachers under obligation to him by a most helpful address on teaching Geometry.

Mr. Richardson briefly addressed the Convention, emphasizing the importance of the teacher's mission, in the moulding of the child.
