Official Returns.

Miller 87 Majority.

When on Thursday last Returning Officer McCallen went over the figures he found that 2287 votes had been cast for H. H. Miller and 2180 for R. J. Ball, electing the former as member of Parliament by 87 majority.

Mr Ball has proved that he is a doughty opponent and has reason to be proud of his feat in reducing a majority of 316 to 87. Mr Miller four years ago admitted his majority was swelled by Conservatives, who on this occasion have returned to their fold.

Laurel will have a majority of 51, possibly more. In 1904 we wrote "1800 majority 37; 1900 majority 52; 1904 majority 62."

The riding tide has not continued, a small shift has taken place which may we suppose be taken as a warning that slips have been made that need correction.

Analysis of the Vote.

As an evidence of the interest taken in the campaign we may point out that the total vote in 1908 is 309 larger than in 1904.

Miller got 40 more votes than in 1904, while Ball got 299 more than McKinnon. Allan's ward, No. 1, Egremont, carries the Conservative banner with 68 majority for Ball, while the Glen ward, No. 2, Gleneleg, is the banner Liberal ward with 75 for Miller.

Richardson and McKinnon each took 54 in Hanover, Ball took 178, explaining the drop in Miller's majority, though Miller took only 25 votes fewer in 1908 than in 1904.
