The promise was carried out, but it was found impossible to serve all for at the sounding of the gong the bargains ceased, each time leaving some disappointed ones. The rush and the anxiety to get that two or three lbs extra brought out the bargain hunters some of whom no doubt made other purchases.

COMMENCEMENT Exercises.

The Annual Commencement Exercises of Durham Public, Model and Continuation Schools will take place on Friday, 4th Dec, 1908, in the Town Hall, Durham. An usual, effective preparation will ensure an enjoyable and profitable evening.

The program will consist of address by local clergymen, Insp. Campbell, the pupils, dialogues, recitations, &c. Solos and duets by prominent local singers will also feature the program. The interesting feature of the evening, of course will be the presentation of three medals and two scholarships to the winners of the various grades of the summer examinations and also the presentation of Entrance Certificates to the winners. Dr. F. W. Merchant, formerly a Principal of O. Sound High School and who rose rapidly to the position of the Principalship of London Normal School, and is now in one of the highest Inspectorial positions of the Province, was in Durham on Monday and Tuesday. His mission here is a dual one: not only was he examining the character of the teaching here on a tour to ascertain where best to place the five permanent Model Schools and his mission here was to see just how well adapted Durham was for one of them.

He was pleased with the school and equipment generally, and intimated to Trustees Grant and Ramage that a permanent Model School, guaranteed say for 10 years, would require a new building in which to put the continuation classes leaving the Model Bench as concerned. Mr Justice Teetzel dismissed Daniel McGrath's motion to quash, and the Divisional Court has dismissed McGrath's appeal.

It is proposed to hold the Model term from January to June, a change that has advantages and disadvantages of the latter being, as pointed out by Principal Allan, that the regular teachers would be hindered in the preparation for the summer examinations by the presence of the Model-ites.

A permanent Model School here would give a status to the town, but the great question is would students be found to patronize it? The limitations at present through around it graduates are many and great rendering it very difficult for them to get all at all to put practice the teaching they receive. It seems a pity the government will find that even five schools are too many unless a liberal out-look is allowed the graduates. The regulations placed upon them are so irritating, that had they been known at the beginning of the term there would have been no model school here. It seems a pity that Principal Allan's services, so much appreciated by the Department, should have such a circumscribed field.
