### Official Programme.

Ontario Provincial Fair

December 7th to 11th, 1908.

Lectures are arranged for the patrons of the Winter Fair of 1908 to make a special feature of the cause, prevention and treatment of common ailments of horses, cattle and sheep. It has been considered by the executive of the Winter Fair, that a series of lectures on this subject would be of great interest to live stock raisers. For a number of years there have been addresses delivered at the Winter Fair dealing with the breeding of live stock, proper type, feeding for profit, markets and how to supply them, etc. This year it was decided that considerable time could profitably be spent in a discussion of the ailments which are most frequently the cause of loss to owners of live stock, taking up not only their treatment, but also preventive measures and, so as to assist in a better understanding of the disease, the causes, most likely to produce the disease will be explained. The speakers will be veterinarians of prominence and other well known men who have had practical experience in raising the different kinds of live stock.

Another subject in which there is great interest at the present time is the discussion of the effect on the quality of the cheese will interest all cheese factory patrons. Associated with this subject and immediately following it will be given an address on the feeding value of pasteurized whey. The lectures in the poultry department include an address illustrated with stereoscopic views, and a demonstration showing proper trussing. In the Seed Department, which will be discussed from the standpoint of both the grower and the seaman. Afterward an address on the identification of weeds, will be given with stereoscopic views illustrating the weed plants and seeds in their natural colors.

In connection with the sheep subjects a very interesting and practical address is anticipated from Mr T. D. Wardlaw of Toronto, an expert on Wools. Lectures will commence at 9.30 a. m. on Wednesday and will continue until Thursday night. Judging of live stock will commence at 2 p. m. on Tuesday and will continue until finished. ### Christmas Stamps

A Million to be Sold Before Christmas.



Every penny from the stamps, after paying for printing and distribution, will be used for the maintenance of poor patients at the MUSKOKA FREE HOSPITAL FOR CONSUMPTIVES, and for extending the fight against the dread White Plague. This Christmas Stamp idea was started in Denmark about four years ago, where the cash returns have built and financed a Consumptive Hospital. A year ago, the Red Cross Society of Denmark sold over 400,000 with the co-operation of stores, churches, clubs, and boys and girls. In fact, everybody helped in this popular movement, and this year their National Red Cross Society is selling the stamps all over the States.

#### A STAMP FOR CANADA

The neat little stamp in red and white, like above cut, and selling at one cent each, is published by the National Sanitarium Association in the interests of the Muskoka Free Hospital. The stamp does not pay postage, but may be put on letters, packages and Christmas cards of all kinds, and will bear the happy Season's Greetings everywhere.

Willing workers all over the Dominion are organizing little bands for stamp selling. The hospital board is hoping that over a million stamps will be sold before Christmas, and the work for the consumptive poor from sea to sea will be greatly strengthened. #### WILL BE LIBERAL CONVENTION.

On Friday night last the people of Warton tendered a banquet to their member, Mr John Tolmie. One of the speakers at the banquet was Hon. A. G. McKay, who in the course of his speech said that here would soon be a big convention held by the Liberal party to adopt a platform and outline a policy.

Last year the council of Barrie ventured upon the experiment of printing their assessment roll. It has proved so advantageous that it will be repeated this year. When the motion to authorize the printing was before the council the mayor expressed his approval of the expenditure, saying that he considered it one of the best investments made. The town clerk corroborated this opinion.

#### BRANTFORD WILL VOTE ON LOCAL OPTION.

The Brantford city council by a vote of 8 to 7 decided to submit a local option by-law in January. The council chamber was crowded with large deputations representing the hotel and temperance parties, and the proceedings were lively. No petition signed by 25 per cent. of the ratepayers was presented to the council, and the matter of submitting a by-law was entirely optional. Should the by-law secure the necessary three-fifths vote 16 hotels and 4 shops will go out of business there.



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
