Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives Makes an Urgent Appeal for Money.

\$25,000 Required to Cover Bank Overdraft and Provide for Maintenance of Poor Patients.

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Now Bishop Farthing.

The Synod of Montreal, after an exciting experience elected Dean Farthing of Kingston to the vacant Bishopric. His opponent was Dean Evans. The struggle began in October the clergy largely being for Evans while Dean Farthing had the lay vote.

After many votes without result the contest was adjourned till last week and after eleven ballots the necessary majority of both orders was secured by the popular Dean and he is now Bishop of Montreal.

Durham people will rejoice at the outcome.

Rev. Mr. Farthing, the new Bishop, was born at Cincinnati, Ohio, on December 13, 1861. He was educated in England and graduated from Cambridge in 1885 with honours.

Coming to Canada, he was ordained in the same year and took charge of the parish in Durham. In 1888 he went to Woodstock as curate, and in the following year became rector, remaining there until his recent removal to Kingston.

Bishop Farthing married Mary, daughter of Mr J. C. Kemp, of Montreal.
