Commencement Exercises

Friday night last, the Town Hall was crowded to the door on the occasion of the 2nd of Durham School Commencement Exercises. The scholars were out in force, as were the mothers and sisters and good sprinkling of the male sex.

Principal Allan, some of the staff, and the Modelites had a good program prepared, and carried out successfully under Mr. Grant, chairman of the School Board and of the meeting.

After an instrumental solo by Miss Russell, one of the Modelites, who accompanied and rendered excellent service during the evening, Mr. Grant made brief introductory remarks extending the thanks of the Board to the citizens for their attendance and interest.

There was a patriotic chorus by girls followed by a recitation by Miss Taylor incalculating duty no matter if danger frowned. More singing by three little girls, a recitation well done by Devona Warrington, followed by a rattling boys' chorus "Men of the North." A recitation by Florence Bryan and a duet by two boys were good numbers and the humorous recitation by Cecil Wolfe brought down the house. There were fine solos by Miss Gettie McComb and Miss B. Crawford, and a melody by the 28 Model School students contained snatches of most of the popular songs, grave and gay that were ever written.

The closing verses had local applications and they received a hearty encore for which the chairman announced they would sing the closing verses backwards and they did so--with their backs to the audience!

A chief feature of the evening was the presentation of Entrance Certificates to the Class prepared by Miss M. McKenzie, all of whom, 21, passed, no fewer than eleven taking honors, two more than the rest of riding in together. Inspector Campbell in fitting terms complimented them all in possessing certificates bearing the stamp of the greatest province of any country in the world, and had many kind words to say of their teacher who, for the second time had passed all her pupils, 43 in two years. Chairman Grant in the absence of Dr. Jamieson, presented to Miss Lyla Kelsey, the "Janieson Medal" for standing highest in South Grey at Entrance Exam., while Rev. Mr. Newton presented the Trustees' Medal for highest in Durham at Entrance, which fell to Miss Vivian Crawford, she being next to Miss Kelsey. Prin. Allan very appropriately presented his medal to Miss Sadie Ferguson, of Hopewille, who took the highest standing from Form III or Entrance to Normal. The medals are all silver in a neat case and will be highly prized mementoes. Mr. C. Macnagie presented a scholarship each to Miss Eva Renton, highest in Form II and Miss Vaddie Caldwell highest in Form I. A Scholarship is worth \$10.00 entitling the holder to free tuition for one year in Durham Conviction School.

Rev. Dr. Farquharson in a brief address complimented the town and school on the excellent showing. Miss McKenzie was worthy of all praise, but the good work also reflected credit on the staff below who laid the foundations. He spoke on the expansion that had taken place and was glad to have heard the suggestion that Durham might be picked upon as a site for a permanent Model School.

A very pleasing evening was closed by a dialogue in which there was some excellent dramatic power shown, the leading characters were Miss Vaddie Caldwell and Brock Grant who acted their parts well. God Save the King and then all went home happy.

Horse Fair--Next Tuesday.

We would again call attention to the coming event of next week, the inauguration of a Monthly Horse Fair in the town of Durham. The movers in the matter have the best interests of town and country at heart and we hope their efforts will be rewarded by a generous turn out. When buyer and seller gets together business can be done, and it requires no prophet to foresee good business in working up a market, such as is proposed. Several centres have done so, others are following suit, and Durham must be up with the procession.
