61. Both before and after the dedicatory prayer Solomon blessed the Lord and the people. He gave God glory, but for wealth, honor, power or victory to Israel, but for "rest." Not one word of God's promises had failed (v. 56). "This is a distinct reference to Deut. 12. 9, 10, where we read that when the Lord should have given rest to Israel, then a place for sacrifice, etc., should be appointed. That place was now being dedicated, and Solomon saw the proof that the rest was at last fully attained.
