Artemesia Delighted with Local Option.

Prosperity attends the Abolition of the Bar-Room. Every Business Centre Improved.

The following statement has been prepared by the Artemesia Prohibition Alliance, and explains itself:

When Local Option came into force in Artemesia Township, Grey County, in May, 1906, there were many "blue ruin" prophets. It would kill business, prevent building, etc. As if the Lord made everything on earth dependent upon whiskey!

What is the condition of the four villages in the township to-day?

Priceville, a quiet old Scotch village of 2000 souls, formerly enjoyed (?) two licenses. One house is still open, and is easily able to accommodate the travelling public. The other has been sold, and converted into an up-to-date general store. The C. P. R. has built a branch line through the village, and trade is as good, if not better than ever before.

Ceylon, too, had two licenses with the old order of things. Just as Local Option was coming into force one hotel was destroyed by fire. Yet that hotelkeeper, after two years in a rented house, under Local Option, during the past summer built a new hotel, sheds, and stable. And we're told that it does not pay to keep hotel under Local Option! One of the storekeepers has built an addition to his place of business, one new store has been erected, and one new residence, besides extensive improvements to several other homes.

In Flesherton, the chief village in the township, marked improvements have been made during the last three years. W. A. Armstrong has erected a beautiful block of two stores and a telephone office; George Mitchell, a block for the Standard Bank, and also a tailor shop; W. E. Richardson, a stock company, the Park House; J. Nolin, a magnificent residence, while George Watson has established a saw-mill in the village. Besides, the police trustees laid over \$8,000 worth of cement walks.

The track of the village is indicated by the new buildings erected. Not for many years has there been such a forward movement in Flesherton.

Eugenia is a quiet place, with one hotel, and is practically unchanged during the Local Option period, although the Georgian Bay Power Company, which has acquired the fall, has expended considerable money in tunnelling the mountain, preparatory to establishing a power plant.

In the rural portions of the township prosperity is equally evident. New houses and barns or buildings virtually renewed are to be found on every road. Certainly local option did not kill business or prevent building in Artemesia.

I believe the township is agreed that the law is an improvement upon license. There may have been violation of the law, as there is of all laws, yet in the main it has been very successful.

Dominion Parliament.

Meets on 20th January.

The announcement has been made that the new Dominion Parliament will meet on above date. This is somewhat earlier than had been anticipated, but the delay is doubtless due to the absence in England of four of the Cabinet ministers, one of whom, the Finance Minister, is responsible for the estimates and for other important business. Mr. Fielding's absence at this time is due to an effort on the part of the Canadian Government to obtain the ratification of the Franco-Canadian Treaty of Commerce.

The meeting of parliament on Jan. 20 will be for the swearing in of the members of the Lower House and the election of a Speaker. That done, the Commons will adjourn until the following day, when the customary formalities of the opening will take place in the Senate chamber.

The programme of private bill legislation for the approaching session of parliament, from present appearances will be decidedly light. The Senate will accordingly try to do for the bill it devolves the duty of sifting out the evidence in all divorce applications, of which there are already fourteen on hand to be dealt with. This is the largest number of divorce applications ever received in any single session.

It is now conceded that the Speakership will go to Mr. Charles Macell. Mr. Hugh Gair, of South Wellington, and Mr. McIntyre, of Southport, are mentioned for the Deputy-Speakerhip.

That Liberal principles are growing in New Brunswick is shown in the recent by-election for Carleton and Northumberland. The Conservative occupants of these seats resigned them to contest Dominion constituencies in the recent elections, and they were both defeated. Now the same fate has overtaken their successors, for in the provincial elections just held two Liberals were elected. This points to the early overthrow of the Hazen Government.

District News.

FROM NORTHERN ONTARIO.—Harry Sterne of Hamilton spent Sunday with the old folks and Mrs. Sterne at Drummond. Harry is travelling in Northern Ontario, among the mining towns of that section. He reports a boom on up there at present and predicts that it is but the beginning of the greatest influx into Northern Ontario the section has ever seen. There is no talk of money stringency up there and business prospects were never better. The recent mineral finds and the prospects of still greater discoveries will be the making of that northern land.—Leader.

SAUGOEN PRESBYTERY.—The Presbytery of Saugoen met in Westminster Church, Mt. Forest, on Tuesday. The morning was devoted to business. In the afternoon there was a conference on the laymen's missionary movement, with the Rev. T. D. McIlloch, of Hamilton, in the chair. The Rev. F. W. Anderson, secretary of the Young People's Society, opened the discussion in a clear and forceful address on missions in general and the latest development in relation to them. The Presbyterian Church in Canada is planning to raise one million dollars per annum for missions. \$21,000 would be the share of Saugoen Presbytery. Discussion followed, participated in by Mr. Jas. McMurtrie, Harriston, Mr. Howie Palmerston, Mr. Renwick, Drummond; and others. Rev. J. R. Bell, Laurel, represented Orangeville Presbytery, spoke on the cognate subject of Home Missions. A resolution was passed recommending congregations to form Mission Associations wherever such are not already in existence.—Confederate.
