Statute Labor Comdemned.

It is gratifying to know that 153 townships in Ontario have abandoned statute labor and adopted the cash system for the maintenance of roads. Sixteen counties in Ontario have also undertaken a good roads program by which the outlay of \$3,200,000 will be made, of which the province will bear one-third under the provisions of The Roads Act.
