The Annual Meeting of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance will be held in Elm Street Methodist Church, commencing at 6 a. m., on Wednesday, March 3rd.

A treaty, almost certain to be ratified, between France and Canada, promises to have the effect of inducing American industries to come to Canada.

Hon. Wm. Templeman, the only member of the Ministry defeated in the recent election has been elected by acclamation for Comox-Adlin, B.C.

The Local Legislature meets on the 16th inst. Hon. A. G. MacKay will lead a small but valiant band of Liberals against the Conservative hosts.

Oregon, Nevada, Nebraska as well as California are passing anti Japanese legislation in spite of President Roosevelt. They are daring the little brown men.

NOTES FROM OTTAWA.

Canada's Credit Good.

Canada's credit abroad is good. The loan recently floated by Hon. Mr. Fielding has been absorbed by the investing public in England, according to the London financial papers. This is very satisfactory coming at a time when the English papers have been full of misrepresentation with regard to Canadian people and affairs. The fact that the Grand Trunk Pacific is employed in operation for 1,000 miles is itself the best evidence that Canada is usefully employing the money required for public enterprises. English investors cannot fail to remark and be satisfied with the large reduction in the estimates and the provision made for reduction of the public debt. It shows that Canada has capable men as the head of affairs.

Liberals and Economy.

The careful manner in which the Government conducts public affairs is amply demonstrated by the estimates for the coming year. The amount involved is \$19,298,398 less than last year, and the total amount required on consolidated fund account is a little over \$80,000,000. While Canada did not suffer from the widespread commercial depression to the extent experienced by other countries, the Government considered it wise to exercise the greatest economy consistent with a due regard to the public service, and the estimates for the coming year have been framed accordingly. The people of Canada will appreciate the wisdom of this course.

Advertising Himself.

Mr. Foster has advertised himself at the expense of the county by giving notice in parliament of a large number of motions, covering every possible subject. Few of them will ever be debated but they will always be on the order paper until withdrawn and from now until the close of the session they will have to be drawn in their order. It would appear as if Parliament meets for the express purpose of affording opportunities to Mr. Foster to air his particular hobbies. The House is tired of the man, he has become wearisome to both sides. He assumes to project himself into every discussion as if nothing were complete until he had expressed opinions upon it.

There are so many new men in the House, that the prominence Mr. Foster gives himself has been the subject of uncomplimentary comment by members upon both sides. They are wondering how they will ever be able to do anything for their own constituents if Mr. Foster is allowed to absorb all the time available to private members. There should be some limit to the number of motions any one man is allowed to make during the session, and the work of the House would be greatly facilitated.

Must Stop Obstruction.

The Government should take early steps to regulate the debates and put a stop to the tactics of Mr. Foster, whose aim in life is to embarrass and obstruct the Government. The man does not realize that he can never be a Cabinet minister. The Conservative party may use him in the House as a mud-slinger, but they will never permit him to take a prominent part in a general election and prejudice himself into every discussion as if nothing were complete until he had expressed opinions upon it.

The period of financial depression has happily passed and Canada has passed through the ordeal with credit. The Government has given evidence of its intention to be economical, and the national credit is good. The people of Canada are to be congratulated upon the present condition of affairs. They have placed in power a Government which appreciates the magnitude and importance of the task which has been committed to them.

County Council

Dr. Ego, physician of the House of Refuge presented a report for the past year. There had been 18 deaths among the inmates and the ages which were given showed an average of 71 years. They were six over the score mark. After hearing the list of deaths read, a member inquired if there was any inmate left in the institution and was informed that there would be plenty of evidence presented to prove that there was a considerable number.

William Kerr wrote a lengthy document on the subject of the county appointment valuator which he held it was obliged to do.

W. N. Chisholm and Adam Brown wrote in reference to exhibiting county fruit at the Provincial horticultural show.

Geo. Binnie and J. S. Rows asked for reappointment as auditors. C. A. Fleming also applied.

Among the accounts was one from Breckenridge & Sons of \$49.40 for furniture for the judge's room and another from Neil McGillivray for keep of Geo. Roy situated in the House of Refuge institution.

Reports of committees were presented from Finance, Education and House of Refuge committees.

The chief item in the finance report which was read by Mr. Hastie of Egrement, was that the application of Cleland for grant of \$500 be laid over for consideration until the June session and that Col. Cleland be asked to state his reasons why such a grant should be made. The usual motion to adopt this report was passed without a question.

The report of Education Committee presented by Mr. Wilson of Bentinck, recommended as its principal item that the petition from ratepayers of S. S. No. 7, Collingwood, asking that arbitrators be appointed to settle the question of a new school section, be granted.

The County Council adjourned Saturday about noon, after a session marked by strict attention to the business in hand, and entire absence of anything approaching discord. So noticeable was this that the Warden took occasion to make it the ground of a special compliment to the councillors.

Saturday was closing day, and was mainly occupied in straightening out any little matters that needed attention. The application of Col. Cleland for a grant of the 31st Regt. Meaford was brought up by the Warden who mentioned that he had been in conversation over the phone with Col. Cleland, who asked him if possible, to have the matter reconsidered. The regiment goes to camp before the June session; and if the grant was a great deal of extra work was involved in sending each man his share.

The Colonel had asked him to say that the grant went to supplement the pay of the men; not a cent of it went to the officers.

In reply, Mr. Hastie chairman of the Finance Committee said that the matter had been fully discussed in committee, and he did not think they would change their decision. For his part he thought they had been paying that grant too long.

Dr. Mearns' request for refund of moneys improperly paid by urban school districts was referred to the County Treasurer, to be reported on at the June session.

On Friday the Owen Sound and Meaford railway was before the Council, which was asked to lend a hand in obtaining aid from the Ontario Government. The following resolution was carried, on motion of Mr. Legate;—that the Warden, Mr. Hastie and the mover be a committee to draft a memorial asking the Ontario Government to grant a sum of money equivalent to that already granted by the Dominion Government toward the building of the missing link connecting the Grand Trunk Railway at Owen Sound and Meaford.

Another matter of interest was the state of the county by-laws, the Warden, Messrs Garvie and Legate were appointed a committee to examine the by-laws and have those that are now in force and which affect the Council printed in pamphlet form and a copy sent to each member of the Council. The Town Council of Owen Sound might well follow the country's lead, in finding out, at any rate, by what laws are in force.

A request from local members of the legal profession, to have telephone put in the offices of the Sheriff and County Court Clerk and in the Registry Office, was not granted.

Abraham Lincoln.

Born 12th Feb., 1809.

Friday of this week will mark the completion of 100 years since the birth of Abraham Lincoln, and far beyond the bounds of his own country, hearts will warm to the memory of a man, a mental giant, with gigantic soul, in forefront of the people, wielding power as trust from God.

All libraries contain, or should contain, the story of his life: his lowly origin, his struggle for an education, his love for home and stepmother, his physical prowess combined with the gentleness of a saint, his legal ability, his far-seeingness, his humor, and above all his surpassing statesmanship and executive ability in a great crisis, should be known and valued for generations to come.

He ranks among the great men of the nineteenth century, by some accounts the greatest and seldom, it is universally admitted, have such surpassing beneficent qualities of head, heart and hand been united in one man.

From a warm appreciation of him by Camille Sanderson of Alabama we extract one stanza:

"There came a little child, born to a life of toil A life of fierce struggle, keenest pain. His clear intellect with vision blest, And the bright humor of a nature true, His stout heart that felt, but feared not wrong.

His great soul that opened wide his doors Of hope and comfort to earth's hopeless ones, And so he grew in stature with the years; In wit and wisdom, if devoid of grace; In tenderness of heart, if not of speech; For neath ungrateful form and rugged face There dwelt heaven's royalty in human guise."
