



COUNTY BRIDGES.—At a meeting o County Council here last week, a contract was let for the construction of a steel bridge over the Saugeen River at Stirton's, the price being \$15000. When the council meets in June they intend to let the contract for building a bridge over the river at Southampton. This will cost \$20,000. Billy Jacques, reeve of Arran, has a scheme under way which will load onto the county a bridge over some quagmire in that township, and this will also likely cost \$20,000. These northern reeves lie awake o' nights, thinking out places to put more bridges, while the patient toilers in the southern townships, lie awake trying to figure out how they are going to pay for them. The county debt is piling up by leaps and bounds, and the end is not yet. The system is a most unfair one. The township of Carrick, for example, has no county bridges, and has no interest whatever in these northern bridges, yet Carrick pays a large percentage of every one of these county bridges. To even up things, the county ought to assume all bridges over eight feet in width.—Walkerton Telescope.
