Baptist Anniversary Services.

Sunday and Monday last the Baptist congregation here held its Anniversary Services in beautiful weather and under happy auspices. The presence of Rev. Mr. Dayfoot, of Simcoe, proved inspiring, and he has made friends and acquaintances on this his first visit, who will welcome him back at some future time.

The services on Sunday were well-attended and proved stirring helpful and enlightening.

Monday evening the church was filled with an appreciative audience not a few being from the sister congregations in town and it is safe to say they did not go home disappointed. The choir were in good form even though Mrs. Newton's absence is felt, and they gave several appropriate selections in a pleasing manner, the parts being well balanced.

Rev. Mr. Newton was in the chair and fittingly introduced the lecturer whose mysterious topic had been puzzling the people for some days before: "The Man with 3 Eyes." The lecture was not long developed the play upon words was seen the "I's" being the initials of the three sterling qualities, Industry, Integrity, Integrity. Under these three heads he developed a fine lecture which all who heard could profit by and regret that a wider audience, especially of young people, could have come under its influence. Very powerfully he showed how the possession of these qualities built up the individual and through him ultimately the nation was uplifted. He showed that they had a commercial as well as a moral value to their possessions and drew a fine picture of Canada's future, if the inculcation of these qualities were constantly impressed on the young.

Rev. Mr. Farquharson was called upon and conveyed the greetings of the Presbyterian congregations. He complimented the Baptist body under their energetic pastor of having undertaken the erection of such a fine edifice, and on making such good headway of clearing it from debt. He congratulated them on the success of another Anniversary and closed by moving a hearty vote of thanks to the lecturer for his "practical pointed address." The C. O. F. Banquet.

Almost 100 of the members, wives, and friends of the Canadian Order of Foresters assembled in Calder's Hall Friday night last to participate in their annual social reunion. It was a splendid evening outside, and the committee, with Chief Ranger Lloyd, are to be congratulated on the excellent manner in which they satisfied the wants of the inner man, following which a interesting and extensive program was furnished. It had been the intention to have present to address the gathering, High Chief Ranger Stewart, but finding it impossible to attend, he supplied the local lodge with two able High Court officers in his place, Messrs W. L. Roberts, auditor of Hamilton, and Jas. Cooper, organizer of Brantford.

Shortly after eight o'clock with chief Bert Willis in charge, a dainty oyster supper was served by a number of obliging waiters, to which the large assembly did ample justice. Before commencing the program, Chief Ranger Lloyd called Dr. Hutton to the chair, who asked all to join in the "Maple Leaf." The Dr. modestly refrained from delivering an address, leaving that part to the visiting brethren. Interspersed throughout the program, were fine solos, by Miss Dawkins, Miss Ada Limb, Miss Mamie Munro, and Mr. Wm. Irwin, a brother of Mrs. Harvey. Mr. Frank Irwin ably rendered a couple comic selections. Mrs. Sprout, Mrs. Stonehouse provided themselves eloquentists of no mean value, while the former's cute little daughter delighted all with a recitation also. For variety step dancing by Messrs Vollett and J. Murdoch "caught" the gathering also violin selections and accompaniment by Messrs T. McDougall, R. and Mrs. Watt. Miss Rita Irwin accompanied satisfactorily throughout, besides giving a pleasing instrumental.

Before commencing his address, Mr. Roberts intimated it would be necessary to curtail it somewhat, owing to limited time. But in the half hour or so on his feet, a wealth of information was presented. There are now approximately 70000 members of the Canadian Order, the 3 past years receipts totalled \$1,979,418.95, 921 death claims were paid last year, in all \$996,891.52. At the end of 1908, the balance on hand was \$2,758,940.52 and the interest for the year,

amounting to \$101,858.33, paid 26 per cent, or one quarter of the death claims. Since 1906 the surplus has increased by \$779,078.89. 5,836 sick benefit claims were settled last year, totalling \$134,672, leaving a balance of \$29000. To show the immense strides taken in this branch he instanced the fact that in three years the balance on hand had doubled by over \$3000.

After a humorous opening, the organization of the Society was discussed by Mr. Cooper. In 1870, 400 broke from the Independent Order of Foresters of the World and were made members without restriction. The first death claims were paid from the member's own pockets and at end of year the surplus was \$800.

Mr. Irwin spoke for a short time in a humorous strain and at the close a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the two guests for their interesting and fluent addresses, followed by "God Save the King."

The Late John A. Munro.

Monday afternoon last the spirit of the above gentleman left its earthly tabernacle, at or four or five years of infirmity, borne with patient endurance. Though long frail, the end came suddenly at last, a sudden breaking up of the system taking place.

Mr. Munro was born in Ainess, Ross-shire, Scotland, over 70 years ago, and came to Canada in 1861. He taught school at Heathcote, in East Grey for six months, and shortly after got a position in the O. S. Registry office where he remained for 11 years till the establishment of South Grey Registry office in Durham, when he was transferred here. For 30 years he did the duties here and was promoted to the Dep-Registrarship. He was an excellent penman and his duties were efficiently done.

Only one of deceased's sisters, Margaret, is alive, and in Scotland. His wife, who was a Miss Lauder, a niece of Registrar Lauder, and sister of Mrs. Buchan, of town, Mrs. W. E. McAllister and Wm. Lauder, of Varney, survives him. To them were born six children, Lauder, now in Omaha, Nebraska, William in town, Douglas in Regina; the daughters are Margaret, Jessie and Mary. These will long cherish the memory of a kind and indulgent husband and father.

Mr. Munro adhered to the Presbyterian faith, was Conservative in politics, and was hearty and genial in his palmy days. He was an enthusiastic Scotsman and a lover of Scottish song and Scottish literature. He was also an ardent sportsman and from these varied features his removal will bring memories to a wide circle of friends.
