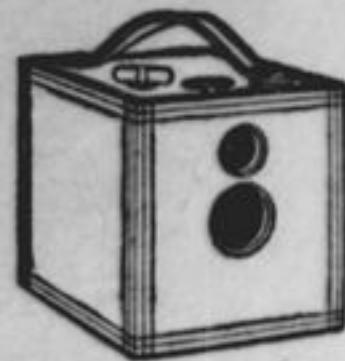

Hopeville.

Died on Friday 26th Feb., Mrs. Wm. B. McDonald at the home of her daughter Mrs. Webster near Dundalk.

The deceased lady's maiden name was Miss Mary Ann Deszell a daughter of the late William Deszell who came with his family to Proton over 50 years ago and settled on the 10th con near the Egremont line.

Her husband was past her 70th birthday. She leaves behind her to mourn her loss two brothers, John Deszell of Hopeville and Wm. Deszell of Osprey. Four sons—John in the States, Wm. B. in Dundalk, Samuel near Dundalk and Charles in the North west and a number of grand children. Her husband was Revere of Proton for many years and was one of the most popular men of his day in Proton.

Mrs. McDonald was well liked and her funeral was on Sunday afternoon to the Epiphany Church. The Rev. Mr. Bockmann of Dundalk officiated at the house, and the Rev. Mr. Gibson at the Epiphany Church and grave.

The funeral journey was near 10 miles and was the largest we have yet seen in Proton.

Obituary

MR. MALCOLM MCINTOSH

Died at 251 Rowden St., Brantford, on the 4th of Feb., Mr. Malcolm McIntosh, a former resident of Glenelg, aged about 70 years.

Mr. McIntosh was born in Benbecula, Lewis-shire, Scotland in the year 1838, and came to Canada with his parents in 1851. The Buffalo, Great Western and Golden Gate Railway was then being constructed, and he worked a few years on that road, and then moved with his family to lot 22, con. 5, Glenelg, where he farmed for a few years until he learned that the raising of a family on a 25 acre close Township until he died was one of the problems that was beyond his vision. It was then he made up his mind to move with his family to Paris where he entered the employment of the G. W. Railway Co., where he served faithfully for many years.

Many of the present residents of Glenelg will remember when Mr. McIntosh's house was the headquarters for stray hands and the easiest way to insult him was to offer him compensation for trouble and accommodation. Some few years ago he retired from his employment and bought a good bank account besides keeping his family.

It was only two months before his death that he paid his annual visit to J. S. Black and other friends. He was married to Miss Sarah Johnston, also a kind hearted woman who predeceased him a number of years ago. They are survived by two sons and four daughters. They are: Neil, of Toronto; Louise, of Brantford; Mrs. Joseph Black of Onondaga; Effie, Mrs. D. Anderson of St. George; Sarah, Mrs. McKay of Hibbing, Minnesota; and Mrs. A. McLennan of Brantford where he died.

He was surrounded by his detested by each member of his family. He was a consistent member of the H. C. Catholic Church and his remains were laid to rest beside that of his wife in the Catholic cemetery at Paris and is followed by the silent prayers of his biographer. J. S. B.
