TOPICS OF THE WEEK.

Mr. E. M. Lewis, M. P., has introduced a bill in the Dominion Parliament, to move the usual hours of work on the railways from the 30th of April to 31st of October. This is modeled after the British Bill which may pass into law this year. This will enforce the carrying out of the old duty: "Early to bed and early to rise."

Britain's naval program contemplates an expenditure of almost \$15,000,000 more than last year in the building of new Dreadnoughts, cruisers, &c. Australia is building two destroyers, other nations are not idle and the great waste goes on, some day to bring upon the world an irretrievable calamity.

The Hon. J. J. Foy has at last introduced his long-looked-for law reform measure, and while it does not go as far as many people could have wished for, as it does go, it is an improvement on the present condition of affairs. Its principal provision is one reducing the number of appeals. The Divisional Court to which all appeals were formerly sent in the first place, has been wiped out altogether, while the right of appeal to the Privy Council has been considerably limited. After this appeal to the Privy Council can only be taken in cases where the amount involved is \$10,000 or more, whereas at present the limit is \$4000. The jurisdiction of the County and District Court is enlarged to cover cases where the amount involved is \$800 under a contract, and \$500 in the majority of the other classes of cases coming under the jurisdiction of these courts. Finally, it is rendered possible for a solicitor to enter into an agreement to carry on a client's litigation for a fixed sum instead of being paid by the present indefinite fee system. These arrangements will be under the control of the courts, which can enforce or nullify them according to their being considered fair or otherwise. The increase in the jurisdiction of the County Court is a good idea. It will relieve the High Court Judges of a lot of labor, and will give the County Court Judges a little more exercise, something they were badly in need of.—Telescope.

This appropriation not to include work on bridges costing over \$25. The said commissioners are required to submit their report in writing to this council of such expenditure before being paid their commission; that the sum of \$125 be expended on the railway road between Louck's mill and the townline of Ephraim, and the reeve expend the same.—Carried.

The reeve and commissioner of division in which work on bridge costing over \$25 be a committee to oversee the work, and no further expenditure be made on new bridges except in case of emergency, save by resolution of this council, and that a by-law be prepared and submitted at the next meeting of this council. Council adjourned.

Artemesia Council.

Artemesia township council met on the 6th with all the members present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of session of Feb. 6 last were read and confirmed. An account from Mrs. McArthur for gravel used on roads was presented and read. Messrs McKenzie and Carson as a committee to inquire into the treasurer's securities presented their report. The securities consist of a bond of the London Guarantee Company for \$4000 with premium paid to February 1910. By-laws 711, to appoint certain municipal officers, and 712, to amend by-law 710, were introduced and read a first and second time. By-law 711 was read a third time and ordered to be signed, sealed and entered on the By-law book.
