

So far the official story. No pen can describe the consternation of the officials and those on the platforms as the train swung in at terrific speed, and with neither bell nor whistle sounding. With a thunderous roar the engine, carrying its load of panie-stricken passengers, who realized that they were on a runaway train and dreaded they knew not what, struck the barriers, jumped through as a hurdler would do, erashed into the side of the station, and swept away a three-foot stone wall as so much paper; into the people were crushed beneath its mad rush, and then on through another stone marble pillars like so many ninepins, Then with a terrific explosion it toppled over. The tender fell over and crashed through the south wall of the station, and hung suspended in the air.
