A Southern City

Concluded from last Week

Speaking of the Sunday closing laws, with reference to the bars, makes one think of the general attitude of the people here towards the Lord's Day. I fear that public sentiment among the majority of our American citizens is not yet aroused sufficiently to protect for themselves and for their children the inalienable heritage of the Lord's Day of rest against the encroachments of its enemies. The tomes arrayed against the day and its sacred associations are strong and unscrupulous, and all that money and lust for gain or pleasure can do will be done to destroy the sanctity of the day and to make it even worse than the other days. In the city of San Antonio the traffic on the streets is not so great as on the week days. I think by far the greater number of the more substantial business houses, except drug stores, are closed. The great contract works are quiet and there is less activity in the civic improvements under construction. But all the minor stores and shops, such as fruit and confectionery stores and stands, newspaper stands, tobacco and cigar shops, photo studios, etc., etc., are open and in full swing. For many of them Sunday is the best day in the week because amusement appears to be the god most worshipped on that day. The theatres, bowling alleys, Billiard and Pool rooms and all other such places are unusually active and

appear to be better patronized than the weekdays.

In the churches themselves there is not as a rule, the air of reverence which we are accustomed to, at home. Before the service begins and even during the most solemn exercises preceding the sermon, there is a bustle and confusion, strangely out of harmony with the solemnity of a place of worship. Suppressed whispering among the pews is distinctly audible and I am told quite a common thing except in the Catholic churches where greater reverence is manifested. I am told too that many of the clergy, if one dares to call them such, are largely to blame for this state of things. Through the desire for sensational things and I fear an utter want of any truly religious convictions, they preach bad ethics and a spurious gospel instead of "Christ and Him Crucified" with such an air of nonchalance and unconcern, regarding the infinite issues at stake that irreverence and indifference on the part of the congregation are not to be wondered at. As an example of this lightness, imagine the effect upon you of the following little gem from the lips of a minister, introducing to a congregation in an inimitable southern drawl, a new pastor recently called to the charge—"I believe if this congregation had searched the whole United States with a fine-toothed comb, they could not find a more suitable man than Dr. ——— and I Dr. ——— searched all Texas with a double billion magnifying microscope, he could not find

another better congregation than this one. Certainly the union ought to be a happy one. There are however noble exceptions, men and congregations who seem to feel the burden laid upon them of upholding by word and deed the cardinal doctrines of the New Testament. Of these one cannot speak too highly for they have contended against surroundings and practices which must try the temper of their faith to the uttermost. If it is true as someone has said that the amusements of the congregation rather than the public professions of its members are the true index of its spirituality or want of spirituality of its pulpit (and who can doubt there is a considerable kernel of truth in it) then, the pulpit has sadly declined from the aim and object of its divine Founder. In any case, it is true that here the amusements of the majority are undoubtedly those which minister to the lower nature,—to the physical appetites and passions—and not to the intellectual and spiritual forces which make for a higher life. In Sunny Texas

Mr. Campbell writes interestingly of Texas Laws and School Matters.

Nichol's Ranch, Comfort, Texas, March 12th 1909.

Dear Mr Ramage,

Last week I referred to some differences between our laws and those of Texas. It would be interesting to pursue the subject farther for every law in most civilized countries is the outcome or result of certain conditions—is the effect so to speak of certain causes which in themselves are always of interest to a student of human affairs. But my space and time will not allow me to mention more than two or three other curious or extravagant laws which when the causes which produce them are known may be easily accounted for. First.—The penalty for carrying concealed firearms in Texas is a fine of \$500. This penalty seems stupidly excessive and doubtless in our country and in most of the states would be regarded as a relic of barbarism. But when it is considered that Texas is the home of the cattle-rancher; that many parts of the state were settled by horse and cattle thieves escaped from justice in the other states and by adventurers of all sorts from anywhere and everywhere; that most of them were a law unto themselves and depended upon themselves to secure their rights, real or supposed, by the use of such weapons as they possessed; that many lives were sacrificed to the too ready appeal to the convenient fire-arm always carried on the person and that the administration of justice over such vast areas of wide lands sparsely settled as they were, was a costly and almost impossible task, it will readily be seen that of ingent restrictions and heavy penalties were necessary before there was begotten that wholesome respect for law that would have recourse to that law for justice, protection and compensation in case of insult or injury. In spite, however, of this law I believe that four out of every five male persons carry revolvers and know how to use them. Even the girls and young ladies I am told, are generally capital shots and can ride a horse and use a rifle or revolver almost equally as well as their fathers or big brothers.

Another curious Texas law is that the upper sheet on every hotel bed must be nine feet in length. The purpose of this is that the sheet shall be long enough to fold over the blankets or other coverings from contact with the sleeper. This law for purely sanitary reasons. This law if properly observed and the sheet changed daily would ensure for the traveller a clean bed. In connection with this it may be said that the object of the law was to prevent the spread of Tuberculosis. It is affirmed unhesitatingly that Tuberculosis cannot thrive in the climate of Texas, that no cases originate here or are to be found except those brought in from outside points, that indeed any cases except the most advanced can be cured here if the patient remains long enough and takes proper precautions by living right and doing what his physician directs. A few years ago scores and hundreds of patients who were threatened with or actually had tuberculosis came into the city or state for their health until the authorities became alarmed lest the disease should get a foothold among the native citizens. To prevent this a law was passed prohibiting any person affected with Tuberculosis in its later stages at any rate from entering Texas. But from personal observation in San Antonio I judge that the law is not very rigidly enforced. One thing however, is noticeable and that is, that the people here relying on immunity on account of the climate conditions have no fear of the disease. They feel that except under very extraordinary circumstances, inoculation or contagion is practically impossible.

Another very curious thing, at least to your humble servant, is the legal status of married women in Texas. But a full discussion of this interesting question would be too long I must be content with a few sentences concerning it. In general, it turns out that married women have practically no legal standing at all under the laws of Texas. This leads to many curious anomalies and disabilities which our women would, I imagine, resent as a serious infringement of their rights and privileges. First, a married woman or any woman in fact in Texas cannot vote though she be worth a million in her own name and right. Women cannot occupy any civic office such as mayor, alderman, school trustee, etc., she has no "official say" as to the manner in which the taxes she has to pay may be expended. She cannot direct

except through private influence, the course of study for her children in the public schools or anything connected with their education here. Worse than that, a married woman cannot, without the consent of her husband, withdraw from the bank her own money even if that money were her own absolutely before marriage. But her husband may by his own cheque without her consent and without her protest draw her money from the bank and appropriate it to his own use. He may even bequeath her property or the greater portion of it so as to alienate it from her or her friends forever. One would think that in the face of these disabilities, no woman in Texas with property or money would marry at all. But such is not the case for statistics prove that love laughs at laws here as elsewhere. There are times, however, when a real injury is wrought. In cases where a husband becomes a vagabond or a drunkard or becomes alienated from his wife for any cause, she then has a grievance the magnitude and results of which may be appalling to her and to her children. I am told, however, that such cases are extremely rare.

At the present time many of the distinguished women in the state have taken up the cause of the colored people and are agitating for a change in some of the state laws with a view to making them equal in rights with the white race. They have organized a "Sisters Club" with branches in every important centre of the state one object of which is to secure for women by co-operation with the colored people the legal right to occupy a seat on the School Boards if elected to that position in the same manner as the white race. They also hold that in this position they have better facilities for knowing the needs of children and the legal right to be elected the same as men. They also hold that since our women have enjoyed for a quarter of a century or more, concerning the state of other educational matters, both urban and rural, and the subject of inter-racial education, it is quite a difference to have the colored people in the same schools, there is quite a difference in the way in which the colored people are treated in the same schools, especially in the case of the colored people who are provided with separate schools. This destroys the unity of the system of public education in every important centre of the state. It is a hindrance to the progress of the colored race and retards its progress very materially.
