## A Touch of Fire.

Thursday night of last week, a little before midnight, fire was discovered in the old frame building just north of the Webster jewellery store. The night watchman was among the first to discover it, and he made for the alarm bell. The Brigade were soon at their duties, but before they could get to work, it was evident they could not save the frame building which burned like a tinder box and sent out sparks and flying scraps of fire over the town for the wind was slightly from the Northwest. Fortunately, a recent snow had blizzeted the roofs or there might have been another tale to tell. The firemen very efficiently fought the flames and it was soon seen that they would prevent its spread. The one opening in the brick fire wall opening on Telford's stairway was well watched and the hose was played around it on both sides. When the fire was thought almost extinguished an important discovery was made that a blaze was growing in the Webster cellar and the hose was quickly got to work again being taken through the shop and fired down the stairway. This later fire was caused by sparks going through the stairway, falling on some old invoice and receipt files which Mr A. Gordon, owner of the building, had stored away.

This fire was also put out and the tired but valiant firemen were given much needed refreshments by Mr Ed Kress.

The buildings were owned by the McKeechne firm and though of no great value in themselves, their destruction is a serious loss to the owners for they had them rented and were drawing from them ten dollars a month and had just rented the upper flat for \$4 more.

MR JAS. GEDDES.  
One of the most esteemed pioneers of the township of Egremont was removed by death in the person of Mr Jas Geddes at the home of his son James on lot 17 con 2, on Tuesday 25th inst at 11 a m, at the age of 77 years, 4 mos and 7 days. The deceased had been suffering from an attack of a grip and had sufficiently recovered to be about the house; on Tuesday evening the 16th while sitting at the table after partaking of a good hearty supper was seized with a paralytic stroke disabling one side and loss of speech and although receiving the best medical aid and tender nursing by his family and friends he remained unable from his age to shake it off. The morning of his death he seemed quite easy and fell into a calm and peaceful sleep in which condition he crossed the Great Divide almost unnoticed by those around him. Truly we may exclaim, "Oh Death where is thy victory."

Mr Geddes was born in Kressth, in the parish of Dumfriesshire, Scotland in the year 1831. In the year 1853 he married Janet Carson and the same year emigrated to Canada with his then young wife landing in Hamilton the time of the great colliery plague where he remained but a few years coming to Egremont 53 years ago last fall and settled on lot gore A on the 10th con where together they toiled bearing their share of the many burdens and trials of the pioneer settlers.
