Through the courtesy of Mr. James McK. Robertson, Toronto, the REVIEW is enabled this week to present its readers with a cut of the Durham Old Boys who composed the 1889 Cricket Club. Mr. Robertson always took a deep interest in the grand old game, which is now being supplanted to some extent by lacrosse, baseball and other sports, and would be pleased, with many of us, to have it taken up again in town this year. Time has wrought many changes and separations in the two decades; three of the group have passed away, four are still in town, and the remainder are widely scattered. In Canada or the States all of the old boys, we believe, have done well and are a credit to the old town. A brief reference to each would not be amiss:

Mr W. S. Hynds was formerly an employe in the Review Office, but for quite a number of years past has been on the Toronto Telegram staff.

Messrs Archie and John Robertson are two of the number still in town, and conducting a flourishing tailoring business.

Mr Robt. Laidlaw, youngest brother of our present Mayor, is assistant freight agent for the Michigan Central Railway in Detroit.

Mr Arthur H. Jackson is also yet in

town in the conveyancing business, and will probably be the most readily recognized.

Mr Ed. Lauder is now Dr Lauder with a large practice in Cleveland, Ohio, and frequently sees the old town when visiting his father and brother here.
