The disciples went everywhere preaching the gospel. We bave seen their success in Samaria, Joppa, Lydda and Caesarea. Phenice-The district between the Mediterranean and the twenty miles from a point a little south of Tyre, and embracing the two cities of Tyre and Sidon, Syprus-A large island in the Mediterranean Sea, sixty miles from the coast of Palestine. "It was remarkable for its richness of soil and the dissoluteness of its inhabitants." It was the birthplace of Barnabas, and one of the fields of Paul't labors. Antioch-This city now becomes Latin name. the new religious centre. Paul made it his starting-point in all three of his missionary journeys. It was the capital city of Syria, situated three hundred miles north of Jerusalem, and sixteen miles from the seacoast, on the River Orontes. It was one of the three greatest and most luxurious cities in the world at that time and became the rallying point of Christianity, Unto the Jews only-This was the practise of the Jewish Christians when they left Jerusalem.
