A POLITICAL HISTORY OF SOUTH GREY

Whose series of articles on the Political History of South Grey is concluded this week.

Continued from last week.

At a Conservative Convention in 1882, a new name and a new man was brought forward, Mr. Jno. Blyth, of Normansby, and he was put in the field against Hunter. Now was the time of the "Boundary Award" talk, and the Conservative party at Ottawa lent its aid vigorously to defeat Sir Oliver at the election in February, 1883. However a great Liberal Convention of Provincial dimensions, held in Toronto in January, (Mr. McPhee being a delegate) roused the country and Mowat did not "go." He was sustained by a fair majority, but Hunter was defeated, Blyth getting a good majority.

From 1883 to 1886 this parliament lasted, only three sessions, the reason being that readjustments had been made, called of course a "gerrymander" by opponents of the administration.
In 1886 the Reform Convention brought out Mr. Wm. Irvine, his opponent being the only possible one, John Blyth again. Irvine ran well except in Blyth's home township, which again proved that "Normansby can do it, and Blyth was now the strongest man in his party.

This parliament lasted till 5th June 1890, when hundreds of Conservative clocks announced that "His hour has come," meaning Sir Oliver Mowat, now, by his opponents generally dubbed "The little tyrant." The Reform Convention brought out Hunter, who after a thorough canvass, carried the riding, beating the only man who ever beat him. He did little more than take his seat however, when death overtook him, having in a strenuous contest, overtaken his strength.

In 1887 a new name appeared in the Dominion contest. Dr. Jamieson of Durham, being brought out against the redoubtable Dr. Landerkin. Dr. Jamieson is the first name in Dominion politics. Mr. Wm. Irvine's in Provincial ones, mentioned in these records, whose owners are yet alive: "The Knights are dust Their good swords rust, Their souls are with the Lord we trust."

The election came on and Dr. Landerkin was again victorious, but with no great majority. The country went decidedly Conservative, Sir John's fame as "The Grand Old Man," being a powerful rallying cry.

Again Sir John curtailed the Parliament to four sessions for the third time, bringing on an election in March 1891, the great cry being reciprocity with the United States. This time the Conservative party in South Grey, changed their man again, leaving Dr. Jamieson for John Blyth, but he also went down to defeat by Dr. Landerkin, though by a small majority. Not satisfied with the result, the Conservatives brought on recouments, protests, trials, etc., in vigorous fashion and for about a year Dr. Landerkin was harassed to a degree. An incident of these efforts was the stuffing of the ballot boxes by some over-zealous, ill-advised partisans which almost succeeded in throwing the doctor out, but the trick was clumsily done and detected before the Judge, who confirmed Dr. Landerkin in the seat by a majority of 3, though the true majority was over 50. Enough ballots had been tampered with to give Blyth a majority of six, but the Judge allowed nine that the deputies had rejected, so Landerkin was elected as if by an accident. Mr. Blyth, about four years afterward, died suddenly.

On Hunter's death, a by-election was needed and the Conservative party, dashed perhaps by the double defeat and the revelations, brought out no candidate, and the honors at the Reform Convention went to a new man, Mr. Gilbert McKechnie, who thus had the honor of receiving the only parliamentary election by acclamation ever given in South Grey. Mr. McKechnie represented the riding till 1894 when an entirely new situation developed.
The organization called the "Patrons of Industry," or short "The Patrons" had developed throughout the country a surprising strength, its principles appealing to men of both political parties, and at numerous meetings of lodges in many school sections, members of both parties met and buried the hatchet. Throughout Ontario a large number of Patron candidates were put in the field and South Grey was well to the front. At an enthusiastic Convention the Patrons of South Grey brought out Mr. David McNeill, whose affiliations in the past had been with the Reform party. The Reform Convention brought out again Mr. McKechnie; the Conservatives brought out no one. The battle came on and when the smoke cleared away Mr. McNeill was the victor by over 500 majority, but throughout the province, Sir Oliver Mowat still held sway, though the new movement had about 20 representatives.

Sir John died in the June following his victory of 1891, his place being taken in succession by Sir John Abbot, Sir John Thompson, Sir McKenzie Bowell and Sir Chas. Tupper. The latter brought on an election in 1896; the Conservatives this time brought out Dr. Jamieson to oppose again Dr. Landerkin, but victory again crowned the veteran. The Dominion now went into the control of the Liberal party and up to the

present has continued under the premiership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

The story from this time may be summarized. A Provincial election on April 1st 1898 for the first time since Confederation brought out three candidates. A new name being Mr. J. D. Morgan of Dundalk, the choice of the Liberal party. Dr. Jamieson for the Conservative, Mr. McNeill for the Patrons. This time Dr. Jamieson's hour had come, as he had about 500 majority over Morgan and much more over McNeill. In November 1900 a Dominion contest found Dr. Landerkin opposed by Mr. K. Richardson of Fiesherston and this time the Doctor, victor in six contests, went down in defeat. Shortly after he was appointed to the Senate which position he held for a few years before his death.
In May 1902 Mr. Geo. Binnie crossed swords with Dr. Jamieson, but failed to dislodge him. In 1904 a Dominion election found South Grey for the first time since Confederation, with both candidates new men. The Conservatives substituted Mr. C. McKinnon, of Durham for Mr. Richardson, the Liberals picked on Mr. H. H. Miller of Hanover, the latter winning by 516 majority.
On 25th January 1905 the Provincial forces again lined up Mr. John McKechnie of Durham facing Dr. Jamieson but was defeated, along with his party, which, since Mowat's retirement had been led in turn by A. S. Hardy and G. W. Ross. The premiership now went to J. P. Whitney who still retains it.

On the 8th of June 1908, Dr. Jamieson met another new opponent in Mr. Neil McCannell, and for the 4th time registered a victory with a safe majority but much smaller than his previous ones. On 26th October of the same year, Mr. H. Miller won from his townsman Mr. J. Ball, suffering also a reduction in his majority. Who will be next the future only can tell.

O. A. C. Number 21 Barley.

In the spring of 1909 9,972 selected grains of the standard-bred barley were planted by hand at equal distance apart in the Experimental Department at the Guelph College. When the plants were ripe, they were carefully examined, and thirty-three of the most promising ones were selected, harvested and threshed separately. In 1904, thirty-three separate lots of barley were grown from the plants selected in the year previous. From that time forward, only the best strains were grown in the tests as follows: fourteen in 1905, eight in 1906, even in 1907, and three in 1908. In one instance over forty bushels of barley were grown in 1905 as the product of one seed planted in the spring of 1903. Of all the selected strains, the one which is known as "O. A. C. Number 21" has made the best record. In each of the last two years it has actually given better results than the Manchester variety in yield of grain, in freedom from rust, and in both length and strength of straw in the experiments at the College, and also in its covering of the ground about Ontario. The grain is quite easily distinguished from that of the Manchester variety.

From one pound lots of the O. A. C. Number 21 barley sent along with two other varieties to Experimental Unit applicants in each of the past three years, several hundred bushels of this barley were grown in Ontario in 1908. One farmer in Huron County harvested nine hundred bushels of the O. A. C. Number 21 barley in 1908, which was the third crop produced from one pound of seed sown in the spring of 1906. Farmers who had low test barleys planted a large local demand for seed this spring from their neighboring farmers, and in some instances realized as high as \$1.50 per bushel. The demand for seed next year will likely be more general, as the barley will be better known. It is quite probable that in a very short time this barley will be grown more extensively than any other in Ontario.

Improvement of Farm Crops by means of Cross Fertilization.
Besides the work in selection for the improvement of barley and other farm crops, the College has made twenty-five distinct crosses between leading varieties of barley, oats, spring wheat, winter wheat, and field peas, within the past seven years. About forty thousand hybrid plants, besides one hundred and seventeen plots of hybrid's, were grown in the Experimental Department in 1908. Some interesting and important results are expected from these hybrids during the coming season.—For all information apply to
