Board of Health, Egremont.

Board of Health met May 21st. Members all present. The Reeve was elected chairman.

He stated that the object in calling the meeting to consider and settle accounts in connection with small pox cases shown of three claims were entirely rejected. There are still four cases under quarantine. All the cases are clearly traceable to their origin, which shows the terrible contagious nature of small pox as well as the apathy and carelessness of the patients and friends concerned, forgetting the Divine truth, that we are our brother's keeper. To this end our Medical Health Officer, Dr. Shoop, strongly recommends vaccination and the Board concurs with him on this point and desires to make an earnest appeal to the fathers and mothers to protect their innocent children against this loathsome disease afforded by a primary vaccination, or by re vaccination as the case may be, and do it at once.

We fear an outbreak of this disease in our town, hence the necessity of the above appeal. Regarding the expenses of these small pox cases, the Board recommended that the Council take steps to collect the amounts paid in fees to the Medical H. O. from the parties able to pay under the authority of Section 93 of the Public Health Act, R. S. O. 1897, Chapter 248.
