

SUMMER RESORT WATER. In all cases where pollution of the supply of drinking water is suspected, should be boiled for twenty minutes before using. Cool the water so treated by placing ice around and not in the vessel containing the water. By doing this, possible pollution from using impure

ice will be avoided. Many people do not like the "flat" taste of boiled water. This can be removed by a simple process of aeration.

Tie several thicknesses of cheese cloth over the jar containing the water that has been boiled and place in the open air. In a little while it will be as sweet and palatable as before treatment.
