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Farmers' Institute

The Annual Meeting was held on Tuesday. The attendance was slim indeed and we can't imagine the intelligent farmers of South Grey, properly seized of the importance of these meetings.

What should be done to properly and effectively arouse their interest we are not prepared to say offhand, but it seems too bad to have wide awake professors met with a show of indifference.

Secy. Binnie read the report of the Executive. There had been during the year 15 sessions, 34 addresses, and an aggregate attendance of 1500, much less than the average of past years.

The auditors' report showed receipts of \$382, the annual excision being the largest income producer by far. The expenditure was over \$352.

The regular winter meetings will again be held in Durham and Hanover. Supplementary meetings at Holstein, Drumore, Aytton and Elmwood.

Pres. D. Edge and Secy Geo. Binnie were re-elected. John Philp, Egmont, was made Vice Pres; Auditors—C. L. Grant and Wm Young.

The municipality representatives are: Nunanby—Jas. Peter, J. W. Blyth Bentick—Wm Scarf, Thos. Morton Gleneg—Thos. McGirr, Wm. Aljos Egremont—G. Lichuan, W. H. Rogers Hanover—G. Mitchell, Val Kirchner Durham—C. Ramage, Wm. Irwin

Prof. Reynolds who was here last year was again the speaker, success in his topic was "co-operation" among farmers. Canada was far behind Denmark and other farming countries of Europe in this respect.

The cause of the slow progress was jealousy and mistrust of each other.

He outlined the aims to have in view: to save price of middlemen; to have products properly graded by a competent man thus commanding higher prices and increasing the good name of the country or district; to have produce to one place and sold by one person.

All this important confidence is one another an mutual trust, the securing of which was the greatest difficulty encountered.

The keynote of his speech was that farmers must be loyal to one another, must trust their own appointee on the management and banish suspicion.

He quoted successful Guelph experiences, an increase in success in Ohio, and of failure in Benton Harbor, because middlemen made extra efforts to break up, of set purpose, the co-operation among farmers in fruit raising, packing, &c. Co-operation was possible in grain growing, stock raising, dairying and in other ways, but all depended on mutual confidence.

In Denmark practically every farmer was in co-operative Associations for eggs, beef, grain, butter, cheese, hogs.

For 40 years they have been trained to loyalty.

That these groupings were not joint stock companies with watered stock. A bon association at Bleinheim netted enough to purchase a building.

In Norfolk 10 years ago an orchard was a nuisance; not so now when all fruit is taken to one place, graded by one man, instead of each farmer peddling around. In some cases \$1000 had been made off 5 or 6 acres.

Farmers should take lessons from manufacturers who seldom or never failed in loyalty to their customers.

In the discussion which followed appreciation of the address was freely expressed.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to the lecturer and the meeting closed.

Some day a meeting of the Women's Institute was held of which we have no report so far.
