CAN DO IT.

Through Freight Rates.

Effects Railway Companies Carrying on International Traffic.

Ottawa, Ont., June 21.-The Railway Commission has given judgment on the question of its jurisdiction in the matter of compelling railway companies carrying on international traffic to fyle with the commission through freight tariffs to or from Canadian points. The board holds that under the amendment to the Railway Act passed last session it has the right to control rates charged on such traffic. The ruling will affect the international railroads running through Ontario. The question arose in connection with the application of the Dawson Board of Trade for an order of the board compelling a reduction of rates on the White Pass & Yukon Railway, over which practically all the Yukon traffic must pass. The company held that the board had no jurisdiction over freight tariff outside actual Canadian territory. By the judgment handed out this morning the board orders subsidiary companies in co-operation with the White Pass & Yukon Railway in carrying through traffic to fyle rates with the commission and become a party to co-operation of the Board of Trade for a reduction of rates. The board will deai later with the question of reducing rates, but it is probable that a considerable reduction will be ordered.
