**The Veteran Postmaster.**

From the Bruce Times.

The late Malcolm McLean was born in the Isle of Mull, Argyleshire, Scotland, in July 1818. When 21 years of age he came to Canada and taught school for a few years in King Tp., Durham where he clerked for a time in a store. In 1851 he came to Walkerton to take charge of a general store, which had just been opened by Jardine and Valentine, and which was the first mercantile business known to be conducted in the building familiar to Walkertonians of the present day as "the old post-office," and was situated on its present site, nearly opposite Joseph Walker's tavern. In his history of the County of Bruce Mr Norman Robertson says: "Shortly after the opening of Jardine & Valentine's store, John Shennan opened Willoughby's mill, east of the river. In 1852 Shennan was appointed postmaster, the office being known as Brant."

Shennan after holding the office for about a year resigned, when Malcolm McLean received the appointment held it to this day, possibly the oldest postmaster in Canada. The name of the post-office was changed to Walkerton, Sept. 24th, 1857.

Besides being Postmaster here, the late Mr McLean was for many years the sole issuer of marriages in Walkerton, and in more than one instance has issued licenses to three generations of the same family. The house in which he resided for over half a century, and which was formerly the post-office here, has the distinction of being the oldest building now standing in the County of Bruce. The deceased was Mayor of Walkerton in 1870.

The late Mr McLean was an omnivorous reader and being endowed with a retentive memory, accumulated a large amount of miscellaneous knowledge, which made him a pleasing and intelligent conversationalist. During his long and eventful career he was never sick a day, and his passing away on Monday was as calm and peaceful as an evening sleep.

The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon to the C. P. R. station, where the remains were entrained to Durham, interment taking place in the Rocky Saugen cemetery. The beautiful floral tributes, was borne to its last resting place by Messrs R. E. Truax, R. H. McKay, Dr. L. Sinclair, G. A. Fox, N. Crawford and D. McKeehan.
