**Success of Ross Rifle.**

Last year at Bisley the Ross rifle, the service rifle of the Canadian forces, led the van in high scoring, and this year the triumph has been repeated. There are a few disgruntled people who, with very little knowledge of the subject, denounce the Ross rifle, and in the world of it it the highest scores in the force are made by this rifle at every shot. An attempt was first made to have it appear that the rifles used at Bisley were especially made for the use of those using them. This ridiculous story was first circulated by the Ottawa Citizen, with no special knowledge of the subject. Both Sir Frederick Borden and the Ross Rifle Company have emphatically stated that the rifle used at Bisley is the same rifle issued to the forces, yet there are those, led by the Ottawa Citizen, who sit at a desk and talk learnedly of things which can only be known to those who go out with a rifle and face the target. The Ross Rifle adopted by the Canadian Government is the best small arm in the world to-day. This is the opinion of the English press. A correspondent in the Ottawa Citizen, speaking of the rifle, says, "Roodle and graft seem to have been effective, and got in their deadly work." This is hard upon Col. Sam Hughes, Conservative President of the Dominion Rifle Association, member from Victoria and Haliburton, who says the Ross rifle is the best small arm the world has produced to date. Would the Citizen correspondent suggest that Col. Hughes, M. P., was influenced by boodles or graft to express such an opinion?

**Revenue Increases**

Rapid Growth Indicated by Official Returns.  
Despatches from Ottawa give a hint of better times coming judging by the rapid increase in the Customs revenue of Canada.

During July of this year the customs collections amounted to \$1,913,156, as against \$3,732,876 in July last year, which is an increase of \$1,819,720. During the first four months of the present fiscal year the total collections were \$18,003,153.

During the same period last year they were \$14,538,745, so that the total increase is \$3,544,408. While these figures are not quite up to those of 1907, the record year, the officials of the department are confident that before the year is out the 1907 record will be eclipsed.

**Exploding Submarine Mines**

Ships to be blown up on the waterfront at Exhibition Grounds.  
The submarine mine which plays such an important part in naval warfare will be part of the Military display at the Canadian National Exhibition. These hidden guardians of every port in war time will be laid in the lake in front of the Exhibition grounds and every day at 5 o'clock a ship will be blown up by one of them.

**Send the Blind to School.**

Principal Gardiner asks the assistance of the Review in impressing upon the parents and friends of children with defective sight the advisability of sending such children to the Ontario Institution for the Blind to be educated. The Institution, located at Brantford, and maintained by the Government of Ontario free of charge for board and tuition, is a school for the education of children and youths of both sexes, under the age of twenty-one. It is not a hospital, nor an asylum, nor a home, but a school where children, who cannot see well enough to attend the Public Schools, are given an English education (including music) and taught to do such useful work as the blind are capable of doing. Such education and training most promote the comfort, happiness and independence of those who are deprived of the blessing of sight, therefore the REVIEW recommends those interested to correspond with H. F. Gardiner, Principal O. L. B., Brantford, in time to complete arrangements before the opening of the next session on September 22nd.

**Earthquakes are doing great damage in Southern Mexico.**

Mexico City has also suffered and a tidal wave did much damage along the coast.

The strikers at Glace Bay, N. S., have taken to dastardly dynamite methods against the property of the owners. This will turn sympathy away from them, and cause them to lose their point.

The Imperial Defence conference is now in session in London, the Canadian delegates being Sir Frederick Borden and Mr Brodeur, two members of Dominion Cabinet. The proceedings are supposed to be secret, but there are leaks and some stirring loyal sentiment is escaping, but not much of the planning.

Unhappy Spain! The trouble she was forced to meet in Morocco has been duplicated at home, where insurrection and rebellion has broken out in several quarters, notably at Barcelona. The national forces suffered severe defeats at the hands of the Moors and it appears the home forces are honey-combed with disaffection and the Royal family unpopular. A Republic has been proclaimed in several parts of the Kingdom and the Monarch may fall. The Spanish countries of America are seldom without a revolution: too bad if old Spain goes the same way.

**Glenelg Council**

The council met July 10th pursuant to adjournment. All the members present. The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read as follows: From W. E. Dunn re exchange of deeds with Railway Company, also regarding crossing. From G. & J. McCormick receipt for \$90 for deviation at Glenrodden. From A. D. Cartwright re Railway Crossings. From John Kelly Bank Statement, June 30th. From J. P. Telford re McCormick deviation. From commissioners for wards 2 & 4. Reports on expenditures. By law No. 496 authorizing Reeve and Clerk to execute and exchange deeds with Railway Company was passed.

McMillan-Nichol—That this council have considered J. P. Telford's letter re McCormick deviation and the proposal therein made most respectfully decline to entertain said proposal for the following reasons (1) that we purchased in good faith said deviation from the late John McCormick who was then the owner of the lot (2) That on the 10th day of December 1898 we paid John McCormick the sum of \$60 and on the 9th day of March 1899 we paid John McCormick a further sum of \$60. Both sums being the amount stipulated for by resolution of Council dated November 13th 1898. (3) That the acceptance of the said money by the late John McCormick presumed a mutual agreement between the corporation and the said John McCormick as to the values bargained and sale of the said deviation. (4) That the corporation held peaceable possession of the said deviation for a period of over fifty years.

And for the above as well as other reasons this Council will decline to establish a precedent by constructing a subway (at the cost of the Municipality) across the public highway for Angus McCormick or any other ratepayer and that the Clerk send a copy of this resolution to J. P. Telford.—Carried.

McMillan-Nichol—That the Reeve and Mr McNally be appointed a committee to inspect the original road allowance between Con. 14 & 15 opposite lots 3, 4 & 5 and report at next meeting of Council.—Carried.

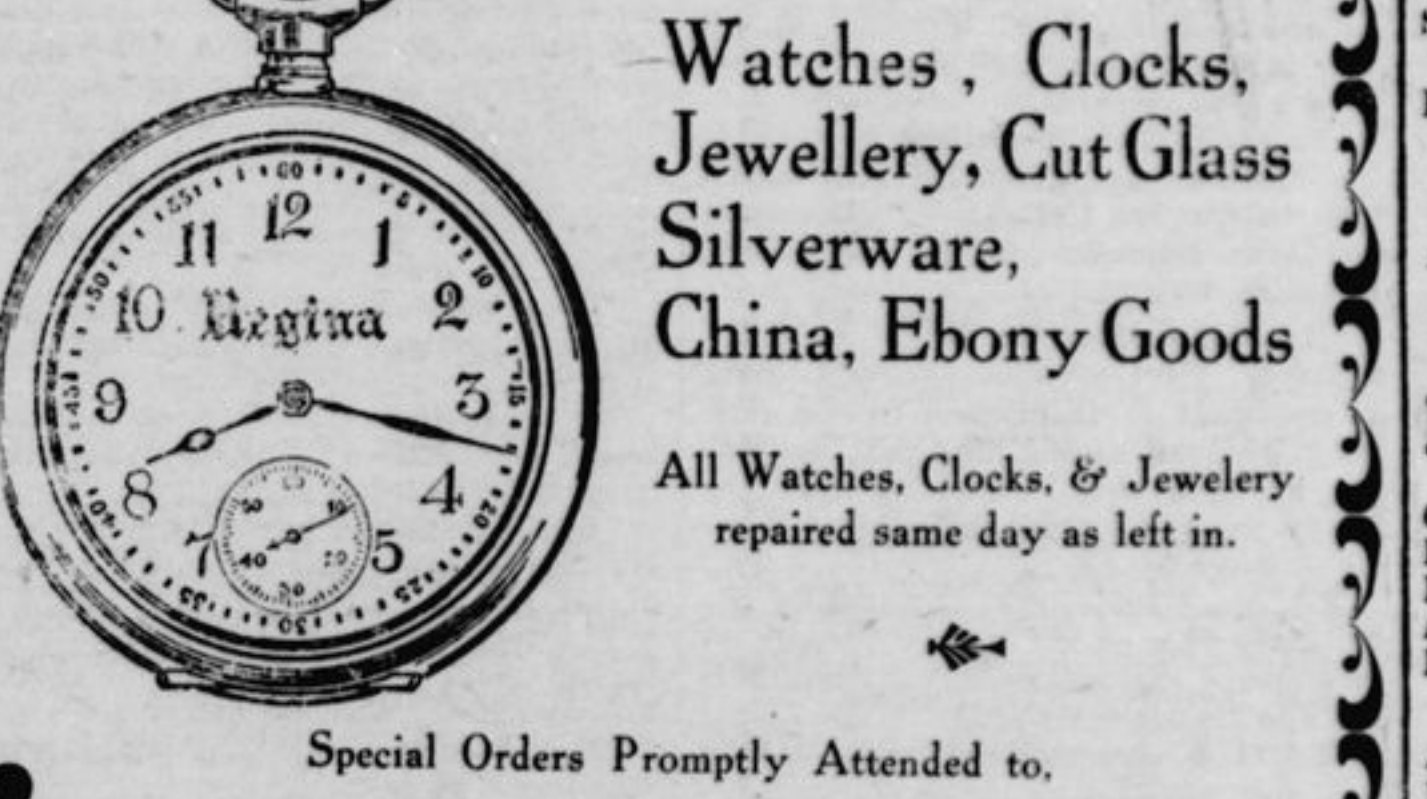
