Dublin, July 9.—The third annual convention of the "Dippers," as the Cooney ites' revival in progress at Ballinamallard, County Fermanagh, is called, presents strange scenes of religious enthusjasm. It is the belief of the sect that the millennium may be ushered in at any moment, and prayer meetings are being held almost continuously.

John West, a well-to-do member of the seet, has placed his large house and grounds, Crocknacrieve, at Ballinamalhard, at the disposal of the convention. The house accommodates 100 persons and the others of the pilgrims utilize the outbuildings and the spacious marquees erected on the lawn for sleeping purposes. Over 2,000 pilgrims are attending the convention.

The little colony is the realization of the idea of simple, self-supporting communal life, and should go far to please a Tolstoi.
