The New South Africa

The British House of Commons has passed unanimously the second reading of the South African Constitution Bill. This is an extraordinary measure, when it is considered that only a few years ago some of the new provinces were at war with the empire of which they are now forming a contented integral part.

South Africa stands to-day much as Canada stood in 1867, rather better in fact for Nova Scotia was then sulky, while apparently there is no such feeling in the new Dominion, if they are going to call it such. She has a difficulty greater than ours however, in the colored races, who preponderate numerically, and who will not be given equal rights in the matter of government, though no doubt they will get a justice that Kruger never gave them.

Another feature like ours—more the pity—is that the Dutch language is to have full equality with the English. This no doubt is one of the conditions that has secured the union. One may hope that Canada's record and example may prove of great service in guiding this new state in the British empire in paths of forbearance, peace and progress.

The New Ontario Readers.

To-day the new Ontario Readers for use in the Public Schools of the province were placed on sale. About 200,000 of them are ready to be sent out to the various schools throughout the Province. The new books are an excellent example of the bookmaker's art. They are larger than the old books, printed with bigger type, on better paper than the old ones, and cost less. They are bound in cloth, with heavy mill board backs, and in such a way as to be practically indestructible with ordinary use.

As regards the matter they contain, Dr. P. J. Goggin, who compiled them, said this morning: "They are for the purpose of teaching children to read, and not so much to give information. Their object is, in other words, inspirational, rather than informational. Certain lines have been followed in selecting the matter. We have tried to cultivate patriotism by including in the books patriotic selections, accounts of historic events, and historic poems. Canadian history has been given a large place. A good deal of attention has been given to nature, Spring, Plowing, Clouds, Rain, Rivers, prose and poetry, Ruskin's Work and Wages, and Carlyle's Honorable Toil. Considerable attention has also been given to sport. Child life in many lands has been treated largely. Sketches on music, tales from the classics, Russian tales, French tales, and twenty-three selections from the Bible, are included in the books. Certain selections from the old Readers have been included in the new books. There are a greater list of Canadian authors than ever before appeared in Canadian schoolbooks. As to the sizes, there are sixty-four pages in the old primer; there are 128 in the new first reader, which corresponds. There were 184 in the old second; there are 224 pages in the new. There were 288 pages in the old third; there are 352 in the new. And there were 344 pages in the old fourth, 416 in the new. The difference in prices is also marked. The primer costs 4c now, as against 10c; first, 6c, as against 12c; second, 9c, as against 20c; for the old; third, 14c, as against 35c; fourth, 16c, as against 40c." The primer is not ready to issue, but will soon be out in ample time for the schools to be stocked with them.—Toronto News.

Allan—Wilson.—That H. H. Wilkinson's account for \$6.00 for attendance on J. Keller be paid and said amount be charged to Mr Keller. Carried.

McQueen—Dadds.—That we tender Jas Lewis the sum of \$18.75 in settlement of account rendered and \$2.60 of said account be charged to Mrs. Pollock and 16.25 be charged to John Wells.—Carried.

Wilson—McQueen.—That the following accounts be not paid; Dr. Brown's account for medical services, having been called by the parties; W. T. Pinders account for consequential loss during quarantine; J. W. Robb for goods destroyed and John Wells for goods destroyed. Carried.

Reeve Haslie No 4, cons 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, from base line to 10th side line.

Clerk No 5, Cons 1, 2 and 3 from Glesgiew townline to Mt Forest. Carried.

Our Winnipeg Letter

Winnipeg, Aug. 14, 1909. Reports of the crop, gathered at first-hand by experienced inspectors of crop conditions, continue to be encouraging. There is a general condition throughout the West of increased acreage and rain enough to carry the crops through. Reports of damage by hail are found to have been exaggerated as to extent and severity by the first reports sent out. As far as the experts' estimates have been collated thus far, it would appear that—after all due allowance has been made for a late spring and some damage by hail—there will be fully more than an average crop of wheat in bushels per acre, and a very much larger total than last year, due to increased acreage. Oats are reported to be generally a shorter crop than last year. Cutting of barley is general wherever this grain was planted, and wheat cutting has been begun in all of the earlier districts. Unless there is a heavy frost within the next week or ten days, the crop will be quite safe from that danger, much of it having already passed the danger point.

Lord Strathcona Coming. There is great interest here in the convention of the British Association, to be opened in Winnipeg on the 25th, and in the proposed visit of Lord Strathcona to this city. There is a very strong friendship subsisting between Lord Strathcona and the people of Winnipeg, and the visit of the aged peer will be given a royal welcome in his old home.
