Captain Fred Hunter's Views.

's There is no such thing as a Nationalist movement in India, " said the captain, in discussing political conditions, " It cannot be thus dignified. There is no 'movement' about it. What it is is simply a band of superficially educated, morally dwarfed conspirators, who prey upon the native traditions and superatitions of the uneducated masses to their own gain.

There are in all about 2,000,000 offleebolders of all classes in India. I do net believe these so-called nationalists could muster a total membership of 2,000, through the whole of India.

Morals are Rotten.

" liehind the superficial mask of intelligence, learning and vast ability, lurks a rotten morality. They are extreme polygamists, These are the men you see coming to America to enlist aid to free India from the British rule, and they are able to convince people they are laboring in a just cause. And they obtain a great deal of money in Seattle, New York and other large cities. This money is being spent for terrible ends, " India, of all the countries of the orient, is least adapted to benefit from reform movements. It is not like China and Japan, which have for centuries been governing themselves. There is a reform movement sweeping the entire tar east. China is feeling it in a vast way. It took a revolution to bringlit about there, but now it is being done by eyolution. In Japan, I believe, the forward march to greater civilization is

" For two centuries India has been a subject nation. It knows absolutely nothing about self-government. The British are trying to teach self-govern ment to the Indians by letting them govern themselves to the extent that it is safe. Misguided members of the house of commons in England who make speeches deploring British rule in India and demand that India be freed, probably think they are doing the thing which they should do for a fellow being who wants his freedom from foreign rule. If they only knew that in so doing they are delaying India's freedom instead of advancing it, maybe they might desist. I believe the people who are laboring in India know best what is best for India, and that people who have not studied India at first hand know less than nothing about it.

IMPERIAL DEFENCE CONFERENCE,-One of the most significant conferences of recent times is the one on Imperial defencé at present in session in London. There is no urgency through danger of war, and there are mixed feelings in Canada on the subject to be taken into account. If unanimity is to be secured, both the kind and the amount of her contribution will have to be carefully considered and frankly discussed. For-
