### British Ceachers for Alberta

For some time the province of Ala sufficient number of capable teachers, and she has gladiy welcomed a number of British teachers who have number of British teachers who have Deputy Minister of Education, deberta has been sorely puzzled to find a regulation came into effect in Brit-ain which threatened to cut off the British supply of teachers altogether.

The regulation provided that before a candidate would be admitted to ; British training college he must agree that, in return for grants paid under the regulations of the Board of Education upon his account, he would serve the Board as a teacher for a specified term. Male students were required to complete seven years service within ten years, and female students five years within a period of eight years, after finishing their courses at the training schools. Premier Rutherford, of A berta, took up the matter with the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and the regulation has been so changed that now the teaching service required may be in any part of the empire in either elementary or secondary schools, proyided (a) That the schools are either maintained or aided and inspected by the state government; (b) Trat service is such as to occupy the whole working time of the teacher. But in order to have the required recognition of the Board, applications must be made through the Department of Education of the province in which the teacher serves. This means that Alberta may get the benefit of the
