Some Facts of the Great Fair

The first Toronto Fair was held in 1878—31 years ago.

It has grown until it is now recognized as the greatest annual fair of its kind in the world.

In those 31 years it has paid out \$1,000,000 in prizes.

The receipts last year were \$534,137 and a surplus of \$47,000 was handed over to the city.

A dozen different countries are represented in the exhibits, and nearly every race has types on the Midway.

The total number of exhibitors this year is 3,274.

The grand stand is big enough to seat the whole population of Owen Sound with Markdale and Durham thrown in. It has 16,400 chairs.

The number of people who were at last year's fair was double the population of Toronto.

Some 200,000 people saw the show before the grand stand.

The exhibition grounds have now a waterfront of 14 miles, and an area of 260 acres.

It has stabling accommodation for 1,400 horses, 1,200 cattle, 500 pigs, and 750 sheep. With cats and dogs and other animals. There are about 5,000 quadrupeds on the grounds.

Some 800 dogs are shown yearly and about 150 cats from all over America.

The largest day's attendance in the fair's history was Labor Day (11) year, when 150,000 people passed through the turnstiles one by one.

There are now 21 large buildings in addition to the live stock stabling on the grounds. Total value of buildings, \$2,000,000.

The fair is managed by a board of twenty-five members, the City Council appointing seven.

"Make it a million," is Dr Orr's motto this year. He wants to see 1,000,000 people pass the gates in two weeks.

Angus McKelvie Not Guilty.

Such was the decision of the Judge in the somewhat famous trial instituted by the Attorney General of Ontario, who, about two months ago, somewhat precariously ordered Angus' arrest. We said at the time without the least hesitation that they were on the wrong track and would be forced to acknowledge it, and the trial has completely vindicated our opinion as to the old country and will join with his parents here in rejoicing at the outcome.

We quote below part of a special despatch to the Globe of Friday last.

"North Bay, Sept. 2.—The noted case of the Crown against Angus McKelvie, a well-known citizen of New South Gresham, charged with the bribery of John Piche to induce him to leave the country and not give evidence in the suit brought by the Attorney-General of Ontario against the Tomiskaming & Hudson's Bay Mining Company, affecting the title of that company, was held to-day by Judge Leask and resulted in Mr McKelvie being found not guilty.

John Piche's Story.

John Piche told of his interview with McKelvie and of receiving the money and stock. He admitted that he had sold his stock outright to the company, and did not wish to go on with the case although pressed to do so. The settlement he made was on condition of his not appearing as a witness in several lawsuits pending against the company. He stayed away three years, and then returned thinking the matter had been dropped. He sold 484 shares of stock to the company outright for \$484, and he was asked to go in the witness box and swear it was only a joke. This he did not wish to do, and claims that he was threatened so that he was afraid, and wished to leave the country. The present value of the stock is about \$180 a share.

Mr. McKelvie's Explanation.

Mr Angus McKelvie swore that he had an interview with Mrs Burwash in regard to her brother's suit against the company for shares, and no other suit was mentioned. He talked the matter over with Piche, and at the time a quarrel resulted. But settlement was made next day by Thomas McCamus, against whom the suit was directed, the witness being present. The witness never arranged with Mrs Burwash to go to Edmonton to warn Piche.

Thomas McCamus, McKelvie's business partner, Ferguson Hutchinson, Secretary of the T. H. & B. Co.; S. H. Ryan, Chief Dispatcher T. & N. O. Ry.; D. T. K. McEwan, and A. N. Morgan, solicitors for the mining company, gave evidence discrediting portions of Mrs Burwash's statements in regard to the payment of two hundred dollars to go to Edmonton, and other matters, tending to show that McKelvie had no connection with anything except the original settlement. Mr Sigaft, counsel for the defence, introduced documents showing that Piche's suit for shares was really the only one pending at the time of the settlement, as Thompson, the nominal defendant in the case brought by the department, died thirteen days before the alleged offence was committed.

Judge Finds No Case.

Judge Leask, in summing up, could find no evidence of a corrupt plan to induce Piche to leave the country. Piche was tangled up in law suits, and it was only natural that he should be glad to get away, especially as he believed his lawyer wished him to swear falsely. One strange thing in the case was the payment of two hundred dollars to Mrs Burwash to go to Edmonton. This had not been clearly explained, but no connection has been shown so far as McKelvie was concerned. Upon the evidence as adduced he found McKelvie not guilty, as it was shown that the settlement in which McKelvie acted concerned Piche's suit against the company, and no reference was shown to the Attorney-General's suit.

War's Terrible Side.

But in the literature extolling the pomp and the glory of war, but little is heard of the field hospitals and yet the bread hospital is one of the terrible realities to be nourished by war literature. It is said that the bones of the Russian soldiers who fell pitifully but bravely in the recent war with Japan, are now used in great quantities to make animal charcoal for the powder mills of Japan.
