1 found, however, that by first add-On the night of June 26th, 1908 Dr. William H. Wilson, a Philadelphia physician, was mysteriously murdered. Somebody had sent Dr. Wilson a bottle of poisoned ale. He drank it and died. For months the police of Philadelphia and other cities have been endeavoring to trace the bottle and lay their hands upon the person who sent it. More than a year has passed, and there is, apparently, no clue to the murderer. A few days ago the Philadel-

phia American came into possession of what purports to be the confession of the man who murdered Dr. Wilson. To one of the staff was sent a letter by a man who asserts that he is the "executioner" of Dr .Wilson. Following the letter came an express package containing the confession and certain bits of evidence which the executioner" forwarded to prove his genuineness. CALVES CURED OF SCOURS. The milch goat, like all goats, can make a living on brushy and hilly land, where most other unimals would starve. They are very beneficial to land in cleaning it of weeds, sprouts and brush. They cannot endure low, wet land, but thrive perfectly on rough, hilly land. Those giving milk should be fed on good grass, hay fodder and wheat bran, but no grain of any kind. The cost of maintaining a goat in milk is about five cents a day, and she will give from one to two quarts of milk a day.
