

SPRINKLING CLOTHES.

If for any reason you have not sprink led your clothes the night before you wish to iron them, try sprinkling them with boiling hot water. Use a clean whisk broom, as it sprinkles them much finer and evener than by dipping the water in your hand. As soon as your clothes are sprinkled,

and tightly rolled up, put on your irons to heat. By the time they are hot your clothes will be ready to iron as nicely as if they had laid over night. Always iron the linens last, as they require more dampness.
