Canadian Money to Russia:

Some interesting figures have been gathered at Winnipeg post office as to the disposition of the earnings of the foreigners. These figures show that the Slav people of Winnipeg alone have sent nearly half a million dollars to their home people in a little more than two years. Since August, 1907, the sum total of such sending of money to the folks at home—chiefly in Russia—has amounted to \$435,936. The figures for nine months of this year, show an outpouring of money earned here to the amount of \$102,866, and the heavy months of the year—November and December—are to come yet. In November, 1908, \$38,725 was sent across by these foreigners, and their December contributions amounted to \$24,306. The figures demonstrate the earning capacity of the Slav in Western Canada and his devotion to his home people, but are not altogether assuring upon the question of the value of these people as Canadians.

District News.

While driving home from town Monday, Miss Bella Scroggie, of the 12th concession, met with an accident that might have terminated seriously. When about half a mile out it appears the bolt of one of the shafts dropped out and the horse becoming frightened and unmanageable dashed along the road, upsetting the buggy and landing its occupants, herself and Miss Tess Scoles, who was accompanying her, on the ground. In a frenzy of excitement the animal headed for home leaving the buggy in detachments along the road. Fortunately a wreck went with the exception of a slight shaking up.—Ayon Advance.

An interesting old gentleman has been the guest of Mr and Mrs R. Cook at Ceylon during the past week, in the person of Mr Abraham Gould of Kansas. Mr Gould ran the old post-office between this village and the station about fifty years. He was in partnership with another man who "did" him out of his portion of the business. He left here for Kincardine with only 50c in his pocket. Later he worked for Mr James Hunter at Detroit, and subsequently removed to Kansas where he accumulated considerable wealth. He has three sons in Kansas, one a lawyer and two on farms. The old gentleman is about 80 years of age, but many men of 65 look as old. He had a longing to visit the scenes of his early life, and has been in Canada for some weeks.—Fleisher-ton Advance.

The First Newspaper.

It was from China that the first newspaper was ever issued. This was away back in the year 718, and it appeared without a break up to the present year. Many copies of the old numbers are still preserved in the museums of the large cities of Europe, and in some of these early copies are accounts of the discovery of America by Columbus. The first English newspaper, which was called the "London Gazette," dated back to November, 1665. In 1689 the first newspaper in the United States was published in Boston. The title of it was "Public Occurrences." In 1729, Benjamin Franklin sent to the public from Philadelphia the first number of the Pennsylvania Gazette.
