Plan to Keep Roads in Repair

By J. W. Holland in "Canadian Farm"

Allow me to suggest a plan of road maintenance. Locate a man as near the centre of a township as possible. Build for him a cottage and stable with shed attached, on an acre of land. Equip him with a stout team, a broad-tired wagon, a plow, a scraper, and such other tools as are necessary. Pay him a reasonable salary, and require him to be at work on the roads every working day. Commencing at the centre, let him work outwards on the most important roads, attacking the worst places first and gradually repairing and improving the entire road.

When the more important roads are placed in fairly good condition he could then direct his attention to the side roads, until he had attended to the needs of all parts of the township. In the winter he could be well employed in hauling gravel and timber for culverts, cutting through snow-drifts, filling up pitch holes and such work as might be suggested by experience or special circumstances.

As to how the money should be provided, I think the government should contribute a share as well as the county, the township providing, perhaps, the largest portion. Of course, such a road overseer should be well selected, a man of judgment, energy and physical ability.

The question of furnishing assistant labor for special purposes would possibly have to be considered, but the main purpose of the plan is to have a man and team constantly at work and always ready to do the many little things that need doing at once. This is only a bare outline of the system, the feasibility of which I would like to see discussed.
