Lord Dufferin lost no time in organizing an administration and Upper and Lower Burma were united to form a lieatenant-governorship Before the annexation of Theebaw's dominions by Lord Dufferin, British Burma consisted of a region lying between the 10th and 22nd degree of

north latitude and the 92nd and 100th degree of east longtitude, have Siam on the east, the Bay of Bengal and Chittagong, on the west, the Indian Ocean on the south and independent Burma on the north. This region had an area of 88,556 square miles and a population of about three millions. The actual province of Burma has an extreme length of about 1,200 miles, and a breadth at its broadest portion of about 480 miles. The total area (allowing 83,473 for Upper Burma) is 171,-430. The population is about 7,500,000 -the males outnumbering the females considerably in Lower Burma, while in Upper Burma the reverse is the case. Nine-tenths of the inhabitants profess the Buddhist faith. There are about a quarter million of Moslem sand about half as many Christians. In education the Burmese rank high when compared, not with the nations of Asia only, but with those of Europe. Unhappily the female sex has until recent years had but a slight share in the advantages of instruction. The staple agricultural product both of Upper and Lower Burma is rice. Maize, sugar-cane, cotton, tobacco are grown. Irrigation is practised in some extent. The jade mines of Upper Burma are almost the only source supply of that mineral, much in request throughout China.
