### Grey's Population is 64,150; Assessment almost \$30,000,000

In the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture's Municipal bulletin recently issued are to be found many interesting statistics, pertaining to the various municipalities of the Province. These are based on the 1908 assessment, and are compiled from schedules returned by the clerks and treasurers of the various

Particularizing on our own County we find its population last year to be 64,150, its assessment \$29.344,618, its debenture debt \$27,000 for which to offset this there is a sinking fund of \$8,500. In the townships Keppel leads in both population and area, with 3,540 inhabitants and 92,720 acres. Proton is second in area and Bentinck third. Normanby is apparently the wealthiest township in the county. Its total assessment is over two millions and it has no debenture debt.
