Ways that are Dark.

License Inspector Beckett is nothing if not active and has caused to be revealed more of the crooked tricks of certain hotel men than any other Inspector in Ontario. The latest was last week at the Patterson House in Owen Sound, told by the Sun as follows:

License Inspector Beckett strolled into the Patterson House a couple of nights ago. Nothing unusual about that, but on this occasion he directed his steps toward the north, where one stairway leads from the "Ladies Entrance" and another leads into the cellar. Mr Beckett proceeded to investigate the walls under the stair, and soon his attention was drawn to the unusual manner in which some shelving was put up. A little further research showed that the shelves and part of the wainscoting came easily away from the rest of the wall. And in the space thus revealed were thirty-two bottles of beer and four bottles of ale. The Inspector impounded these, and proceeded to look for more. He found other movable boards in the wainscot, and other bottles hidden behind them. In all he captured six bottles of "House of Commons" Scotch whiskey, two of Imperial whiskey and one of London Dry gin, all of which, with the beer and ale, he and P. C. Shute conveyed to the cells.

The foundation of the building is eight or ten inches wider than the main wall, and instead of keeping close to the bricks, a wainscot was built on the line of the foundation, forming a snug cupboard. The doors were cunningly concealed, and would escape the eye of anyone who was not looking exceptionally close. They consisted of tight fitting boards, like the rest of the wainscoting, but loose enough to pull out easily if necessary. There was space enough behind to store a good supply.
