The Municipal Council of the township of Artemesia met in the town hall, Fusherton, on Saturday, the 6th day of Nov. 1909. The minutes of last session were read and confirmed. Messrs Walker and Duncanson, solicitors for C.P.R. waited upon the council re closing part of Harvey street in the village of Artemesia. Accounts as follows were presented, viz: W E Richardson for stationery 80c; H Wilson, repairs to grader and scrapers, \$8.85; T A Gilchrist repairs to grader and scrapers \$5.35; J McLeod, oil and repairs for grader 75c; J Cullen for 62 yds gravel. Reports as follows were read: The reeve, report on building and repairing bridges; Mr J. M. Duncanson, on ward expenditure By-laws Nos. 710 to authorize the reeve to pay certain money—and 711 to appoint deputy returning officers and poll clerks were introduced and read a first time.

Carson—Wright—That By-Laws 710 and 711 be now read a second time.—Carried.

Wright—Carson—That Council do now go into committee on By-Laws 710 and 711.—Carried.

Council went into committee on By-Laws 710 and 711. Committee rose and reported By-Laws 710 and 711.

Wright—Carson—That By-law 710 be now read a third time, signed, sealed and entered in By Law book, and By-Law 711 be laid over until next meeting of council.
