The Common Custom of Misapplying This Familiar Phrase.

It is astonishing how frequently the familiar phrase, "The king can do no wrong," is misapplied. It is supposed to be the motto of an unlimited despotism and in some way associated with the doctrine of the divine right of kings. Representative Fowler uses the phrase in this sense in his recent attack on the speaker of the House. Nothing could be further from the real meaning of the phrase. It is the symbol of a system to which the sovereign reigns but does not rule. Nowhere can it be more fittingly applied than to the English Government. The king can do no wrong simply because t is his ministers who do right or wrong, and when the people are disantistied with the ministers they change them, not him. 

From some October records received from members of cow testing associations it would seem that many cows are not expected to earn anything above the bare cost of feed from now till nex spring. But here and there are cows i another class altogether, giving as high as 750 lbs. milk and 23 lbs. fat in Octo ber, not freshly calved cows, but cows that freshened in April or May. Suppoing the ordinary factory patron divides his cows into just two classes, those that pay, and those that do not pay. Is ha even then in a position to place each cow unerringly? Has he records to show how much milk or fat each cow gives month by month, and how much her feed costs? Such records are not only very easily keut, but are invaluable

in determining which cows are paying the best profit and which are just on the pension list. With this information at hand it will be but a natural step to let one or two go off to the butcher.

Their soil is just as good, and capable of as abundant a fruitfulness, as it ever was-save for the fact that, through lack of proper use and treatment, chemical substances of a poisonous nature have accumulated in it. It is these substances that render the land unproductive.

The discovery of these "soil toxins," as they are called, represents one of the newest and most important additions to scientific knowledge in relation to agriculture. It has already gone far enough to enable the experts of the government Bureau of Soils to point to certain definite chemical compounds, represented by actual samples contained in little bottles, as the toxins in question. These substances- not all of which have been isolated as yet, however-are known positively and beyond question to be the poisons that cause "soil fatigue." -From "When the Soil Gets Tired," in December Technical World Magazine.

THE FARM FRUIT GROWING IN NORFOLK COUNTY.

(Canadian Farm.) Owing to the bad weather I did not visit as many orchards as I had intended. strengthening qualities. Fifty the ostrich, has got rid of one of the Mr. J. Gilbertson, the pioneer orchardist J. E. Johnson, the manager, Mr. J. Mc Malley, and others, and there I beheld great crops of Kings, Baldwins, Russets, Spys, Tolman Sweets, and Snows, the Greenings being nearly all packed before

my arrival. Nearly every tree in these orchards ad ten or twelve long poles placed un der it as props, to enable it to bear its load without breaking down, and the upper limbs of many of them were wired ogether for the same reason.

The Olds orchard has the great record of having earned \$5 per tree net for its owner during the last four years, and this year it will earn \$7 to 88 per tree. At Mr. Johnson's and Mr. Olds' I saw two healthy young peach orchards, and the former has, in addition, twenty acres of fine strawberries, nine acres of thrifty pear orchard and a very flourishing

young orchard of sour cherries. At Mr. J. McNally's I saw twelve acres of splendid cauliflowers, thirty-five acres of cucumbers, also pepers and pickling onions, al grown for the pickling factory The Norfolk County Fruit Growers' Association is a co-operative association | which has done a wonderful work during the last five years. From seventeen members five years ago, it has grown to a membership of nearly 200. This year the association will ship in the neighborhood of 20,000 barrels, bringing its members a net return of from \$1.75 to \$2.25



Unfortunately we have to go on record even in these days of widespread and easily available raidy knowledge as owning lots of cows that produce only 2,800 or 2,500 lbs. milk during their best six or seven months. Such cows are no credit to their owners, and such fied title of dairymen. As Canadians we should jealously guard against such a condition of affairs being possible. It is easy to detect those poor cows by recording weights of milk, and it is injurious to any district to retain such wretched specimens, mongrels, not real dairy cows. The queen of the dairy, the select cow, will do infinitely better f handled right by men who put dairy intelligence into daily operation. To return to that pile of cash, if only half the cows in Ontario were made to yield just ten dollars' more milk, it means an extra five millions of dollars within easy reach.
