The Hospital for Sick Children had last year in its cots and beds 1,155 patients—383 of these were from 267 places in the Province. Sixty-five per cent. were children of poor people who could not afford to pay. Since its organization the Institution has treated 15,613 children; 11,550 of these unable to pay and were treated free.
