By fellow-members of Egremont Council at closing meeting.—Other business.

Council met Dec. 15th. Minutes approved. Communications received from Muni. World Election supplies \$10.00. —Paic. J. Corley right of way to gravel pit.—No action. J. P. Tolford, Clark vs Egremont.—No action.

The act of I. Travnor re S. S. No. 4. —Paid S. S. 1. Tp. 3.

A refund for over paid school taxes was made to H. McKinnon \$7.19, Mrs. Mur 45c, Dan Muir \$9.55, Don McKinnon \$6.73.

H. Culp was paid \$10.00 damages to threshing outfit and loss of time.

A special grant of \$25 was made to procure a nurse for Miss O. Carter until she is able to be removed to hospital.

An order was drawn in favor of the Reeve for \$25.55 cost to date Egremont vs Bryan's suit.

Jno McBeth was paid \$18.25 bal. due on tile making.

Comr Watson found that Comr Hunter had let contracts amounting to \$120.67. These are completed. Orders granted. Comr Watson 75c fees. Comr Watson reported ditching and repairs to culvert \$3, telephoning 25c Comr fees—Paid.

Comr McArthur had expended \$2.25 small jobs.—Paid.

Comr Lethian had expended \$39.40 and Comr Woot on O. S. road half a day. —Paid. Comr fees \$4. and \$1.50 for Com work.

A By-law to encourage the erection of wire fences received its first and 2nd reading and is published in Holstein Leader today voted on in Jan 3rd 1910.

By-law No 239 to hold Municipal elections passed.

On motion of Lothian—McArthur—accounts amounting to \$199.90 were paid.

The Financial Statement was read and adopted and 200 copies were ordered to be printed for distribution.

Comr Lothian took the chair on motion and read the following brief address:—

MR HASTIE: In view of your retirement from Municipal affairs and the consequent severance of your long connection with the affairs of our township, we, the members of this official board on our own behalf, desire to convey to you, in a public manner, our high appreciation and esteem which we have for you. During the many years over which you have presided as Reeve you have displayed a fine character which has won our respect. We have always found you ready to help us always ready and willing to bear your full share in all the official work of the Board.

By your many kindly personal qualities and your sense of service, we fully realize a sense of our indebtedness to you. While deeply regretting your retirement from Municipal work, we congratulate you on the many honorable positions you have been called to fill in our County Council.

We trust your way in the Providence of God may still be one of large service and of increasing blessing. But however large and successful your future career may be you will not win truer or more appreciative friends than those who have sat with you around this table during the past year.

Kindly accept of this acknowledgment of our appreciation and thanks for the kind and courteous manner you have always manifested to us while presiding as Reeve over the affairs of our Township.

Sleighing is now good and business is getting brisk. Teaming has commenced.

The Proton Council held their last meeting for this year here on Wednesday 15th, in David Bilton's local open hotel. The most of the meetings for the year were held in the municipality of Dundalk. There was a large number of ratepayers present, chiefly to pay their taxes, as the collectors were there for that purpose. There was considerable talk about who would be the candidates of the Council for next year. The people, nearly all, talked of wanting a change of men all through. The affairs of the township were well talked about, especially the debt of the township was talked over well, and the expenses that are talked about the improvements that are proposed for 1910, would sink the township in a heavy debt that would be burdensome for many years. The new improvements are as follows, in addition the usual expense: to vote on a By-law to raise \$800.00 for bridges in the swamp, to build a township hall at Ventry or buy a vacant church near Proton Station, to make cement sidewalks at the villages of Hopeville, Cedarville, Conn, Ventry, Proton Station, and we expect opposite the Dundalk cemetery.

We expect the Rev. Mr. Gibson will soon be moving all his household goods to his new home near Midway. Our people here are sorry to lose the good company of Mr and Mrs. Gibson, but what is our loss will be other people's gain, and they will carry with them the best wishes of the people here.
